This is a hugely important time for the borough.

We have just published our draft vision for what kind of place we want Haringey to be in the next three years and beyond. The word 'draft' is quite important, because it's not the finished product and it won't be until you tell

us whether we are on the right track. Alongside this vision, we are also publishing our three-year budget proposals.

I have to be honest with you - because the Government is cutting our funding, there will be difficult decisions ahead. We have to save £70 million over the next three years (about a quarter of what remains of our current budget) on top of the £117m that we have saved since 2010.

The council you know now will be very different in three years' time. We'll be smaller in size and we will need to change the way many of our services are delivered, while stopping some things altogether. As Leader of the Council, I think it's quite right that we face up to these challenges now rather than publish a one-year budget (which is the traditional way of doing things) that would essentially mean brushing issues under the carpet for another time.

It sounds quite a bleak picture doesn't it? In some ways it is - and yet while I know that there will be many challenges ahead, I am actually still really confident about the future. Let me explain why. Firstly, the council is working hard to bring new investment into the borough, building more affordable homes and creating new jobs, especially in Tottenham. This investment is important because it will pay for more services and the buildings that they are housed in.

Secondly, I know that as a borough we have a huge amount of talent, a huge number of people who go the extra mile for their neighbours and their neighbourhood. If we pull together as a team we can and will achieve great things. The future is less about one organisation like the council supplying services on our own and more about us coming together to solve local challenges and to support one another. Living in a neighbourhood means that you are part of a team, part of a network that has real benefits and responsibilities. Everybody has a role to play as a team member, however big or small.

That is why our draft three-year vision is called "Building a Stronger Haringey Together" because we cannot - nor would we ever want to - deliver this on our own. It sets out an ambitious vision for what kind of place we want Haringey to be. We want it to be a place everybody is proud to call home, a place where people can access whatever support they need to make the most of the opportunities that exist. You will see a summary of this on pages 8 and 9. We have called this summary "The Deal" because it sets out what you can expect from your council... and how you can help. Please do tell us what you think.

Beware bogus callers

Residents are being warned to be on guard against bogus doorstep callers after a number of incidents were reported to Haringey Council.

In one case, a resident was repeatedly pestered to pay for work for her roof that did not need doing, including the "builder" going so far as to unnecessarily remove roof tiles before demanding payment.

Another resident shelled out £37,000 for a new roof and conservatory, which was left half finished when workmen went AWOL.

While most callers will be legitimate, you should always ask for identification. Contact Trading Standards on 020 8489 5134 or the police on 101 if you have concerns. In an emergency, dial 999.

Haringey council tax to be held again

Council tax in Haringey is set to be frozen for a sixth consecutive year as the council underlines its commitment to helping families who are struggling with household costs.

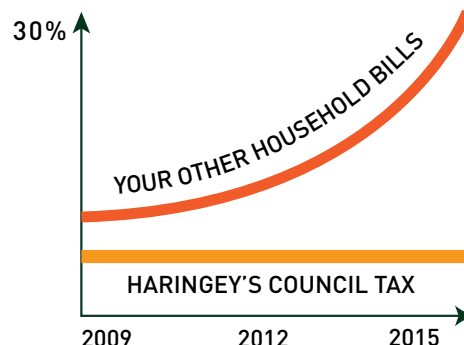
While gas and electricity bills have risen by more than 30% during that time, the council's element of council tax has remained stable.

The freeze is outlined in the council's Corporate Plan and Medium Term Financial Strategy – which together set out key priorities and spending plans for the coming three years. The reports will be considered by the council's Cabinet this month before final decisions are made by Full Council in February 2015.

Celebrating the achievements of children in care

The educational achievements of Haringey's children and young people in care were celebrated at the Aiming Higher Awards.

The awards at Tottenham Hotspur saw more than 140 children nominated in categories including learning achievement; leadership, responsibility and engagement; innovation and aspiration, and community involvement.

This year's event brought extra cause for celebration after the borough's looked after children (LAC) were confirmed as the third best LAC GCSE performers in the country.

Spurs star Etienne Capoue was on hand to present the awards at the event, which was organised by the council's Virtual School

for Children in Care and supported by the Tottenham Hotspur Foundation.

Foundation Chief Executive Grant Cornwell said: "These young people should be incredibly proud of their achievements.

"At the Tottenham Hotspur Foundation, we have the pleasure and privilege of working with a number of the young people nominated for awards.

"We're committed to delivering opportunities that change lives and we know that through the support of Haringey Council we will provide the looked after children in our community with the network, tools and guidance they need to build a positive, stable future."





Laying foundations for the future of council housing

Work on building the first of more than 100 new council homes will start in the spring after winning planning permission.

A total of nine family homes will be built in four spots across the borough, including one home for private sale to help fund the developments and ensure the other eight properties can be offered at a social rent.

New homes approved by the council's planning committee include:

- Four two-storey terraced houses in Clarence Road, Bounds Green
- Two three-storey family homes in Florence Road, Stroud Green
- Two three-story terraced houses in Muswell Hill Place, Muswell Hill
- One three-story house in land off Muswell Hill Place, Muswell Hill

The new properties are the first wave of housing planned by the council, with more than 100 social rent and shared ownership homes to be built on under-used plots of council-owned land.

The programme of building work runs alongside consultation with residents living in poor quality housing on larger estates on how best to bring thousands of modern high-quality homes to the borough.

'Responsible retailers' join fight against disorder

Traders in Haringey are backing the Responsible Retailers Plus scheme, designed to make the borough healthier and safer by reducing the harmful effects of alcohol and associated crime and disorder.

Under the scheme, retailers agree to a number of measures including no longer selling single cans of alcohol; not selling lager, beer or cider with an alcohol content of 6.5 percent or higher, and not selling to people suspected of drinking in the street.

The scheme was launched as part of Operation Equinox, a London-wide drive by the Met Police to reduce violent crime, which can be fuelled by alcohol.

Wood Green's bright future

Plans to bring major investment to Wood Green, with new jobs and improvements to the High Road, have been unveiled.

A Wood Green Investment Framework will set out how different regeneration projects and underused land in the area can be brought together to ensure any new developments help secure Wood Green's future as one of London's best places to live, work and visit.

The comprehensive strategy would look at areas including housing, employment, shops, restaurants and public spaces, as well as exploring how to make the most of proposed transport improvements such as Crossrail 2 stations at Turnpike Lane and Alexandra Palace.

Hooligans banned

Seven men have been barred from entering Tottenham's Love Lane Estate after their anti-social behaviour made residents' lives a misery.

Bayran Eren, Saygin Arslan, Mustafa Karakilinc, Baransel Aksu, Sedat Duru, Nathan Mason and Ozgur Timur were served with a civil injunction following complaints of drug dealing, vandalism and abusive behaviour.

If any of the men breach the injunction, they face arrest and could even be sent to prison.

Safeguarding Crossrail 2

Haringey Council is backing proposals to ring-fence land that would be used for a second Crossrail route.

Crossrail 2 would link north east and south east London, with two branches through Haringey and new stations at Seven Sisters, Turnpike Lane, Alexandra Palace and Tottenham Hale.

The Department for Transport is inviting views on plans to safeguard the proposed route by protecting land that may be needed to construct the line.

Holocaust Memorial Day

Haringey will mark Holocaust Memorial Day with a community commemoration on Tuesday, January 27.

Schoolchildren and residents will gather at the Holocaust memorial in Bruce Castle Park, Tottenham, in honour of the millions of Jews and other people murdered by the Nazis as well as countless others who have lost their lives in genocides.

Two in a row for 'Outstanding' Coldfall

Pupils and staff at Coldfall primary school had reason to cheer this term after being rated 'Outstanding' across the board by schools' watchdog Ofsted.

The school in Coldfall Avenue, Muswell Hill, retained its Outstanding status following a visit from inspectors, whose glowing report said that "pupils love coming to school and are excited about learning" and "teachers and their assistants are extremely committed to making sure every pupil achieves the best they possibly can".

Inspectors hailed the "impeccable behaviour" of pupils at the school, who "arrive to school promptly, listen intently in lessons...answer questions articulately and with confidence" and "take turns to speak and listen without interrupting each other".

The report also found:

- Pupils are active learners during their lessons, eager and confident to build on their progress
- Parents and carers work closely with the school and regularly contribute their views
- The headteacher is an outstanding leader who models exemplary practice for her team
- Consistently high expectations lead to the most able pupils gaining exceptional knowledge in speaking, reading, writing and mathematics

Headteacher Evelyn Davies said: "Our Ofsted report just confirms the amazing team commitment, hard work and inspiration of staff, parents and children. We are of course absolutely delighted!"



Lest we forget

Haringey residents gathered to pay their respects to the fallen at a series of poignant Remembrance Day services across the borough.

November 9, Remembrance Sunday, saw commemorative events at the Hornsey War Memorial; Wood Green War Memorial, and Tottenham War Memorial.

On Armistice Day, November 11, local schoolchildren, clergy, residents and councillors gathered at the War Memorial in the Garden of Remembrance at Tottenham Cemetery to pay their respects in a multi-faith ceremony.

The centenary of the start of the First World War is being marked in Haringey through the council's 100 Years Ago project, which reveals the story of the borough a century past.

Featuring exhibitions, events, talks and more, the project is a chance for everyone in Haringey to learn more about the lives of those who played a part in the war, and the impact it had on Haringey.

Taking pride in recovery from addiction

Haringey residents showed their support for those recovering from drug and alcohol addiction at the borough's annual Recovery Pride event.

People currently undergoing substance misuse treatment – alongside those who have been through the difficult recovery process – were joined at the celebration by friends and family and a range of professionals from the recovery field.

Service user Gina, 43, said: "I don't think people realise how life changing this kind of support can be.

"Between the support offered by the Recovery Family Inclusion Workers and the group therapy with role play from BUBIC (Bringing Unity Back Into the Community), there is a very good chance that I can go back to being a useful and productive member of society again."

Fellow attendee, 63-year-old Angelika, was full of praise for the professional support she has received.

"My key worker helped me to recognise the signs of drug use in my son and introduced me to drug workers that I could talk to," she said.

"With her help, I found the right words to address my concerns about drug addiction with my son."

Recovery Pride, organised by Haringey Council's Recovery Champions and local partners including St Mungo's Broadway and community outreach organisation BUBIC, included a series of awards to recognise the achievements of local people in overcoming addiction.

More than 1,300 people have benefited from Haringey's drug and alcohol treatment services since a revamp took place last January.

The support they have received includes specialist advice and information, harm reduction services such as needle exchanges, testing and vaccination, counselling, and lifestyle and skills development.

Users of these services also benefit from peer support provided by the Recovery Champions, a team of substance misuse professionals and fellow participants from local drug and alcohol services across the borough.

Kids go back to the drawing board to think about the future

“Schoolchildren in Tottenham must have felt like they’d found a golden ticket when they received an invitation to the newly-opened House of Illustration in Kings Cross.”

Pupils from Lancasterian, St Paul’s and All Hallows, and St Francis de Sales schools were invited by none other than Sir Quentin Blake, the legendary illustrator most known for his work on Roald Dahl’s novels, to visit the gallery and education space.

The children were asked to think about – and draw – their local community and their aspirations for the future. And there was no shortage of ambition on show.

Louisa, a year 4 pupil at St Francis de Sales, said she wants to be an archaeologist because “you get to dig up things like dinosaur bones and Vikings and my favourite subject is history”, while classmate Olivia wants to put her drawing skills to use as an architect.

Year 6 St Paul’s and All Hallows pupils Abigail and Andrea both agreed that their favourite place in Tottenham is Bruce Castle Park.

“I wish people didn’t think that Tottenham is a bad place to come from, but somewhere good, where people are well behaved and civilised,” Abigail says.

Abigail also thinks Tottenham would be a better place to live in if it had “new flats and houses and more variety of businesses and jobs”.

But Lancasterian pupil Omari feels the most important thing is for Spurs to improve. His advice to manager Mauricio Pochettino? “Sign Christiano Ronaldo.”

One area where the children were all in agreement was in their love of Roald Dahl’s books and Sir Quentin’s illustrations – the popularity of which shows no sign of waning 25 years after the author’s death.

“I like the dialogue and description in Roald Dahl books, my favourite is Charlie and the Chocolate Factory” says Blessing, from Lancasterian school.

Juanita of St Francis de Sales, whose favourite book is *The Witches*, says she likes “the squiggly pictures” – we’re sure Sir Quentin would approve.



Getting tough on grime with



Seen a pile of litter you want shifting? Does rubbish dumping drive you mad? A new drive to keep our streets clean and get tough on fly-tippers has launched in Haringey.

Operation Clean Streets has seen a host of new and pilot schemes introduced across the borough.

It includes 50 new dual litter and recycling bins, new equipment to jet wash high street bins and pavements, and new rubbish collection times in some roads where there are shops.

The way street sweeper waste is collected is also changing. In the past this waste, which is collected by the council's contractor Veolia, was left in purple sacks at the roadside, ready for collection by a bin lorry.

Now it will be stored in purpose-built containers, de-cluttering the pavement and keeping it out of sight. This change is being rolled out in stages across the borough.

The council is also getting tougher on fly-tipping. More than 50 sites have been identified as hotspots and council and Veolia staff have visited residents in these areas - reminding them how to dispose of rubbish and the penalties they face if they ignore warnings, and encouraging them to report any fly-tipping they spot. Fly-tippers can be hit with hefty fixed penalty notices and prosecution.

Ian Sygrave, a Haringey environmental champion and chairman of the Ladder Community Safety Partnership, welcomed the launch of the scheme.

"When I told my group about this, the response was really positive," he said. "We are particularly pleased about the boxes for storing street sweeper waste as otherwise things can get a bit untidy and unpleasant."

"We also think the machines for cleaning pavements are a great thing and much needed. Overall it's a really positive package and we look forward to seeing it progress."

Operation Clean Streets in action – first month results:

- 122 fixed penalty notices issued
- All reported fly-tipping on main roads collected within six hours and on residential roads within 24 hours
- 3,137 fly-tips cleared
- Veolia received 10,931 requests for services, 997 of these related to fly-tipping

Introducing Haringey's international architecture studio

Tottenham Town Hall; Hornsey Town Hall; Bruce Castle; All Hallows' Church. Haringey has no shortage of architectural wonders, but have you ever wondered why there aren't more places locally for budding designers to hone their skills?

The N17 Design Studio will change that. The architecture practice opened last month on Tottenham High Road, in a collaboration between internationally-renowned firm John McAslan + Partners, Haringey Council and the College of Haringey, Enfield and North East London.

With spectacular transformations of Kings Cross Station and the Camden Roundhouse under its belt, McAslan is a world-leader in design. Their Tottenham practice will inspire local young people to make their mark – taking on five apprentices and holding workshops with

school and college students and the community.

Rhasan Brunner, 19 (pictured), will be managing the office during his 12-month apprenticeship, and hopes to use the experience to make architecture a talking point with local people.

He said: "I'm really passionate about community work and the projects that the N17 Design Studio will be doing.

"I've long been a community activist and when I finished college I decided I didn't want to go straight to university – I wanted

to get some more life experience.

"I want to use the studio as a powerhouse for the community. And since I started it's been great to see all the architects are passionate about that too.

"When I found out that it was opening and I'd be working here, I was made up – it made me so happy."

The snazzy studio – based in an empty shop overhauled during the summer – will also showcase regeneration plans for Tottenham and give more residents a chance to get involved through community events and open days.

Haringey's al fresco community centre

“The community garden is like a community centre without a roof,” says Andy Newham of the Gardens Residents Association, which looks after the garden in Harringay.

And perhaps that's just as well. Following a bumper year that's seen the multi-award winning garden add a coveted Britain in Bloom National Certificate of Distinction and the Royal Horticultural Society's It's Your Neighbourhood award to its growing list of accolades, the addition of a roof might reduce some much needed trophy space.

The site, which features a railway arch that offered access to the old Harringay Arena, has become a focal point of the local social calendar and a popular venue for everything from birthday parties to Halloween fright nights.

“The garden plays a key role in the local community, especially because of the events we put on,” says Andy, who's busy preparing for the annual Carols by Candlelight event.

“What's lovely about the carols is that the young families who've moved to the area bring their older parents and grandparents down.

“It's a really family orientated atmosphere. We get a mix of ages volunteering too, from 5 or 6-year-olds right up to retired people.”

After the Harringay Arena closed, the gardens land was sold off by the Greyhound Racing Association and lay derelict for many years until Andy and his wife Carol spotted its potential for transformation. Seeking advice from the conservation volunteers at nearby Railway Fields they set about the long process of turning the land into a community garden which opened in 2002.

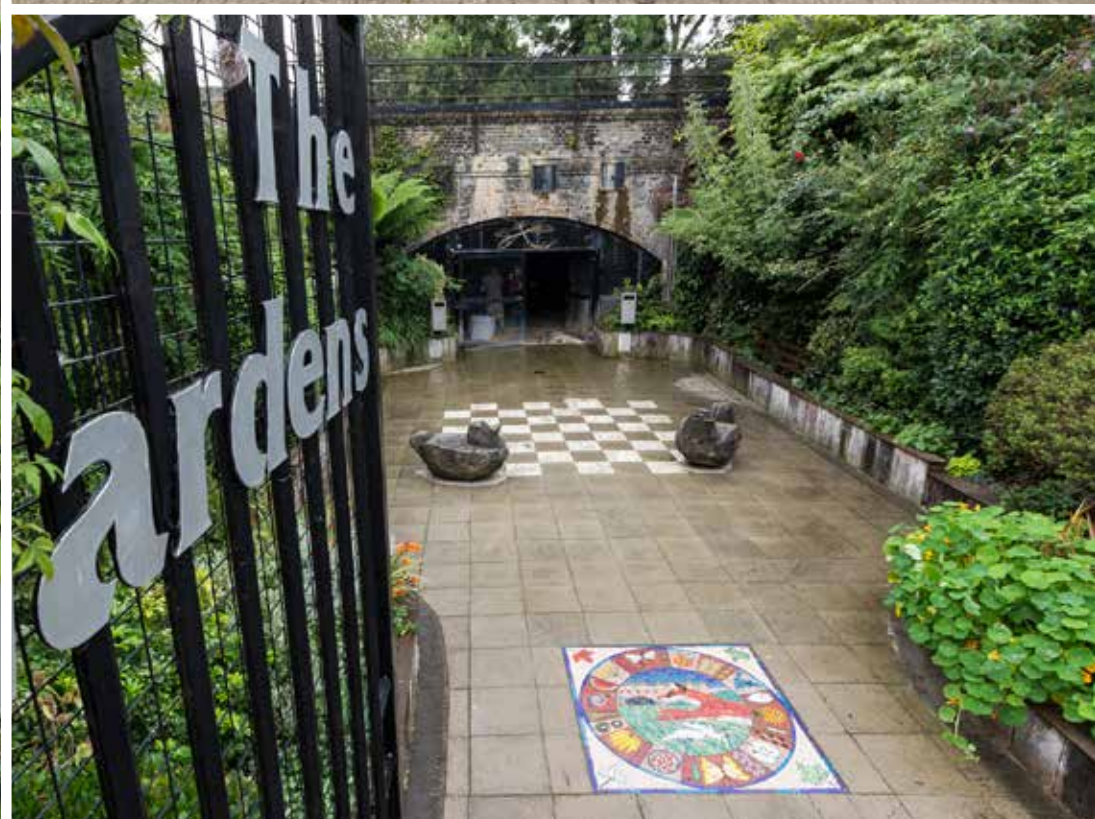
Since then, Andy and fellow members of the Gardens Residents Association have seen the “community garden spread across the local area”, most recently as part of the council's Community Streets neighbourhood improvement project, which has included the addition of raised planters in surrounding streets.

And Andy's hopeful that this year's high profile award wins will encourage even more people to get involved in future.

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Scotland Yard chief's flying visit

Police officers are more used to asking the questions than answering them, but there was a definite role reversal when Sir Bernard Hogan-Howe, the Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, visited St Francis de Sales school.

Children from the school's council interviewed the commissioner, finding out everything from what qualities he feels make a good police officer, to how he feels the Met can attract more black and Asian officers to the force.

Asked whether he liked being the Met's Commissioner, Sir Bernard said: "I love it. I get to ride police horses when I want to, I go up in a helicopter when I want to, and I really like problem solving."

Year 6 councillor Benedict wanted to know if Sir Bernard thinks the police will ever have a commissioner from a BME background.

"I'm not sure if it will be the person who replaces me, or the person after that, but I think there will be a black or minority commissioner in a fairly short period of time," Sir Bernard said, before adding that he felt there was a good chance that his immediate successor could be the Met's first ever female commissioner.

Dr Lane, the Headteacher of St Francis de Sales School, said "I was very pleased to have Britain's most senior police officer come to our school and be interviewed by our pupils.

"This initiative demonstrates that the Metropolitan Police and local schools take seriously our roles to develop and maintain a close-knit community."

Eight year-old Louise in Year 4 said she was "really excited" to interview the commissioner as "she's never met a real police officer before".

"I want to be a police officer in the future now, so I know that I will have to be brave and work hard in school to do that," Louise added.

Clearly impressed by the school council's linguistic skills, with pupils speaking second languages including French, Spanish, Polish and Ghanaian, Sir Bernard admitted he was trying to learn German but finding it difficult.

He left with some advice for the school's budding police recruits: "Work hard at school, support your friends and classmates and listen to what your teachers tell you."

Shovels at the ready for a snowy winter

As Haringey's gritters gear up for a busy winter working across more than 300 kilometres of local roads, residents are urged to play their part in keeping things moving.

The council's winter service plan includes detailed procedures for taking care of 341 kilometres – or 211 miles – of roads in the borough.

If snow falls and ice gathers, Haringey's "Priority 1" network will be first in line for gritting. Priority 1 roads include major transport routes, streets around schools, transport hubs such as bus, Tube and train stations, shopping areas and care homes.

Gritters and snowploughs will be on standby, while the borough's 165 grit bins will be kept topped up and a close eye will be kept on tumbling temperatures so that gritting and salt spreading can be timed right.

And with snow shovels available to community groups and community-spirited residents, now's your chance to play your part as a snow volunteer.

If you know a vulnerable neighbour who might find snowy pavements particularly tricky, pitch in by signing up to work the snow shovel around your local streets.

You can also help by:

- Looking out for elderly friends, relatives and neighbours this winter
- Allowing extra time for journeys on days when gritting can add to traffic congestion
- Carrying warm clothing, blankets, a torch, shovel and suitable footwear when travelling by car

Stamping out anti-social behaviour

Anti-social behaviour can blight neighbourhoods and make residents' lives a misery. But help is at hand and solutions can be found, as one Haringey resident recently discovered.

Sarah was struggling with a neighbour who often made a racket and was abusive to passersby in the street.

"It could be quite intimidating, and it's distressing to not want to leave your house until someone has gone," says Sarah.

"Often the noise was at night so it was affecting my sleep. Other people in the street were also being affected, and it was a real problem for all of us.

"I was also really concerned for the neighbour's mental health and that he wasn't getting the treatment he needed."

Sarah contacted the council's anti-social behaviour action team, who asked her to keep a record of incidents which led to the man being given a warning and later moved to new accommodation.

Sarah said: "I was really impressed with the officer that I dealt with at the council. They were very understanding and explained to me everything that was being done.

"We have not had any problems since then and hopefully our former neighbour is now getting the care that he needs."

To report anti-social behaviour to the council, call **020 8489 1000** or for noise complaints out of hours, call **020 8489 0000**.

Housing Association tenants should report anti-social behaviour to their landlord. If you think there is immediate danger, or a crime being committed always call **999**.

Community Trigger

A new tool for reporting anti-social behaviour is giving victims a louder voice.

The Community Trigger is an option for residents who have reported three incidents of the same anti-social behaviour issue in six months to the police, council or a housing association and feel that no action has been taken.

Residents can report online, telephone or write a letter to the council, asking for their complaint to be logged under the Community Trigger, and listing the details of previous reports.

An initial response will be given within 48 hours and if action needs to be taken, they will be told what was done within 25 working days.

If the complainant is unhappy with this response, they can ask the head of community safety to review.

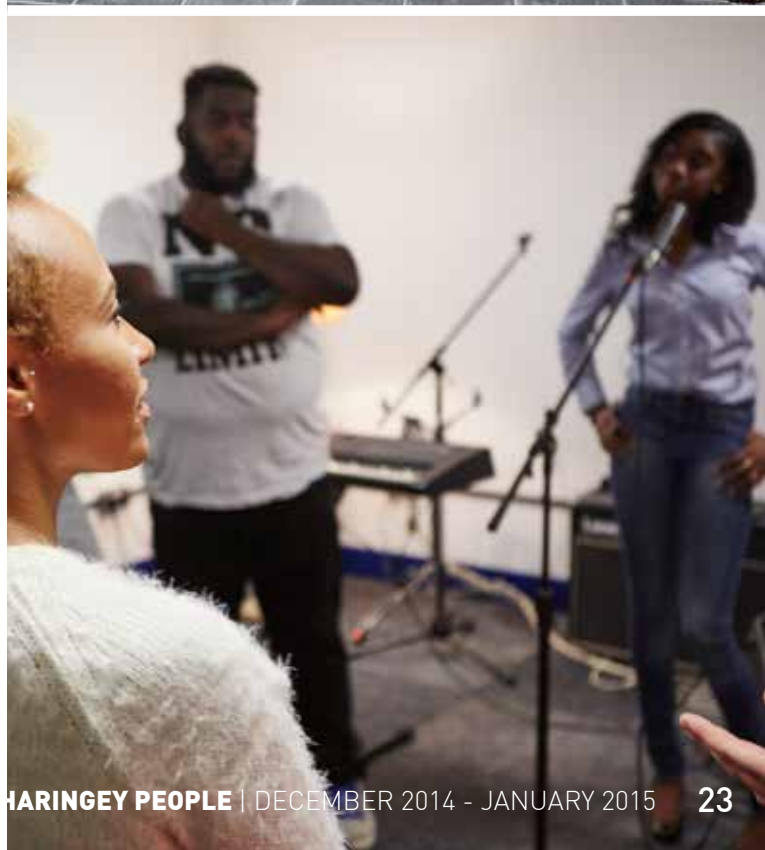

Helping Haringey to better mental health

Many people are aware that around one in four people experiences mental health problems at some point in their lives.

Unfortunately, for too many people these problems remain undiagnosed, making them less likely to access the expert support available to them.

This year's World Mental Health Day saw the council and mental health partners lead a week-long campaign designed to raise awareness of mental ill health and break down barriers to people seeking help.

The campaign brought together the council, the Mental Health Support Association, charity Mind and the Barnet, Enfield and Haringey Mental Health Trust (BEHMHT) and saw service users, carers and professionals take part in activities including an art exhibition, football match and bike ride.

The campaign demonstrated how such activities can help to boost people's mental wellbeing and happiness.

Council staff also signed a pledge affirming their commitment to tackling mental health stigma and discrimination in the workplace.

Nick Barnes, a child and adolescent psychiatrist at BEHMHT, says that negative attitudes and misconceptions about mental health must be tackled so that we can instead focus on positives.

He said: "If you ask people to think of examples of physical health, they tend to say positive things like taking exercise and eating well, but if you ask people about mental health they will often focus on illness and distress."

Roger Catchpole of the charity YoungMinds, which works with young people in Haringey, stresses the importance of intervening early to help build people's capacity to recognise and cope with mental difficulties as they occur.

Roger says: "There's overwhelming evidence that shows a majority of adults with mental health problems had developmental problems in childhood and didn't get the support they needed."

The council is working with partners to ensure that mental health support is as accessible as possible to young people in the community, taking help out of hospitals and into places such as schools, youth groups and sports clubs.

Shedding light on Haringey's glazing heritage

Beautiful pieces of Haringey's history have made their way back to the borough thanks to a generous donation to Bruce Castle Museum.

Dozens of objects crafted by Cakebread Robey, which had branches in Tottenham and Wood Green, have been given, including a war memorial and an intricate stained glass window - formerly displayed at Alexandra Palace.

Founded in 1882, Cakebread Robey supplied building materials. However, it was its more specialist work that made it a household name - with items such as intricately designed stained glass windows, fireplaces and tile surrounds still found at churches, public buildings and in homes to this day.

In Haringey, iconic works include cut mirrors for the Salisbury pub in Green Lanes, stained glass for St Michael's Church in Wood Green and glass for the windows of The Queens pub in Crouch End, which still remain today.

Keith Plummer started as an apprentice builder's merchant and worked in a variety of roles with Cakebread Robey, including branch manager and accountant. He collected various items that the company produced over the years and when branches began to close in the 1990s, he set up a museum at one of the remaining branches in Enfield, filled with relics from the firm's past.

Among those whose interest in attracted was the Western Front Association, who wanted information about a Cakebreak Robey crafted war memorial. The Imperial War Museum agreed to store newsletters that had been sent to staff during the First and Second World Wars, when the firm helped with the war effort.

In 2001, the branch relocated to Barking and items in the museum had to find new homes. Its centrepiece - the Alexandra Palace window that depicts two blacksmiths working with an anvil - will get the chance to be centre stage again with an exhibition in the pipeline at Bruce Castle Museum.

Keith said: "It has been really interesting to see so many people make contact over the years, wanting to find out more about the Cakebread Robey branded item they have discovered in their building.

"I'm glad that so many of these items have found a new home at Bruce Castle Museum, and would really encourage people to take a look and enjoy the rich and diverse range of items that were so skilfully made."

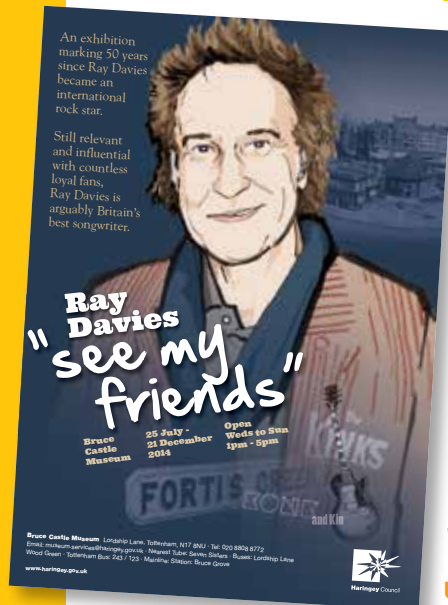
