Fitness rewards

Haringey residents can get more for their money at Haringey's leisure centres with a new rewards scheme.

The free Haringey Sport & Leisure Rewards card gives non-members the chance to earn points that can be redeemed on activities such as swimming and gym sessions.

Every £1 spent earns 10 rewards points, with an extra 200 bonus points available just for registering for the scheme.

A giant stride for Ally Pally regeneration

Haringey's historic landmark Alexandra Palace is a step closer to a £23.9million refurbishment after the Heritage Lottery Fund gave unanimous backing to regeneration plans.

The listed building's Victorian Theatre and BBC studios would be brought back to life under the proposals, which the Heritage Lottery Fund has awarded £844,800 to develop further.

The Alexandra Park and Palace Charitable Trust will now plan the project in detail to ensure the refurbishment gives the building a sustainable future and benefits the local community, before submitting a final application.

The trust has bid for £16.8m in lottery funding, which would contribute the major part of the £23.9m project.

Duncan Wilson OBE, chief executive of Alexandra Park and Palace, said: "Finally we can plan with confidence to bring back to life the glorious Victorian Theatre and the historic BBC Television studios.

"The 'People's Palace' in its entirety can now become a reality, and we are thrilled that the HLF have endorsed our plans for its future in this way."

Green deal for golf club

The grass is even greener at Muswell Hill Golf Club after it became the first in the UK to have a non-domestic Green Deal assessment report.

The club's free Green Deal energy assessment, provided by Haringey Council, identified how it might save money and reduce its carbon footprint through making energy saving changes to the buildings.

John Brazier, chair of the club's Estates Committee, said: "We are currently developing a five year plan for our golf club, and this sounded like a great

opportunity to try to reduce heating bills and protect the environment by reducing our energy usage."

Green Deal assessments help individuals and businesses find ways to improve energy efficiency, and offer loans to cover the costs of installing energy saving measures such as insulation.

Through funding from the Department for Energy and Climate Change, Haringey Council has carried out more than 500 free Green Deal assessments in the borough.

Doors open at enterprise centre

A listed building in the heart of Tottenham has been transformed into a hub for entrepreneurs two years after being damaged in the riots.

The 639 High Road Enterprise Centre offers space and support to ambitious locals starting their own business, with mentors on hand to give expert advice in a unique project supported by Haringey Council.

Help finding work, placements and volunteering opportunities are also available to boost chances for Tottenham's young people to get on the jobs ladder.

The building also boasts exhibition space for local artists and the community.

Ownership of the former council planning offices has been handed

to the Greater London Authority, which will manage the centre with the charity London Youth Support Trust.

Spurs legend Ledley King, Team London Youth Ambassador for Tottenham, joined the opening ceremony.

He said: I work closely with the Skills project, which has seen the transformation of a disused youth centre into a full-time activities hub for 12-19 year-olds.

"Therefore, I am relishing the opportunity to extend this work to wider youth projects in Tottenham and be involved in the new community hub."

Racist tenant evicted

A Homes for Haringey tenant with a history of racial abuse and disruptive behaviour has been evicted from his flat in Winkfield Road, Wood Green.

John Kennedy had a history of racially abusing passers-by and council staff, despite being issued with an injunction in 2009. He also blocked Homes for Haringey officers from coming into his property to make repairs.

Brave neighbours gave evidence to support the eviction case, which was agreed by Edmonton County Court.

Voter scam

Haringey Council and the Electoral Commission are urging people not to use a paid-for service to register to vote.

The independent elections watchdog has contacted 'UK Electoral Roll' after it was alerted to the company offering a £30 'assisted service' to complete electoral roll registrations, and a £1.53-a-minute premium rate number to take questions from customers.

Registering to vote is completely free and no one should pay to do it.



Shisha warning

The Enfield and Haringey Tobacco Control Alliance and trading standards teams have issued a warning that shisha bars must comply with the law.

Bars that use illegal smoking shelters, sell untaxed tobacco, serve tobacco without written and photographic health warnings, or fail to display warning signs about underage sales could face legal action.

All 19 shisha bars in the two boroughs have been sent reminders.



Fraudster jailed

A benefits fraudster who illegally claimed more than £65,000 has been jailed for six months and ordered to pay back the money.

Adama Turay, 38, claimed she was living alone in Etherley Road, Tottenham, when claiming for housing benefit, council tax benefit and income support between April 2005 and July 2007.

But in fact she was living with her husband, who was working. She received £65,757 she was not entitled to.

Bus stop to stay

A trial bus stop in the centre of Muswell Hill has proved been so popular that it has been made permanent and could soon be used for other routes.

The starting stop for the W7 southbound – from Muswell Hill to Finsbury Park, via Crouch End – was moved to outside Boots the Chemist on Muswell Hill roundabout for a six month test-run.

The trial came in response to passengers who said that the bus stop on the steep slope of Muswell Hill was difficult to reach for people with mobility issues, especially those needing to travel to neighbourhood health services at the foot of the hill on Park Road.

During the trial, many passengers told the council that the new stop had made it easier for them to travel to other parts of the borough along the W7 route.



Work to make the stop permanent – including pavement resurfacing and accessibility improvements at the junction of Muswell Hill Broadway and Dukes Avenue – will be carried out by Transport for London over the summer holidays. A trial for the 144 route to use the same stop will begin in the autumn.

Children highlight road safety

Haringey school children helped design a road safety leaflet to be given out to schools across the borough.

Pupils from Bounds Green and St Paul's and All Hallows schools competed to have their drawings included in the leaflet – and seven of their creative designs made the final cut.

The leaflet includes top tips on staying safe on the streets, especially when crossing roads and walking to and from school.

Both schools have taken part in the Junior Road Safety Officer (JRSO) scheme supported by Haringey Council's Smarter Travel team.

JRSO is a London-wide scheme to put children in the driving seat by giving them the chance to have a say on safety issues in and around school.

Time for Twenty?

Haringey Council has unveiled plans for a borough-wide 20 mile-per-hour speed limit to make roads safer for all.

Proposals for the limit, to be applied to all council-maintained roads in Haringey, will be presented to the council's Cabinet on June 18 before a consultation with residents is launched.

Council-backing for a 20mph limit follows appeals from local residents and road safety and environmental campaigners.

Work to introduce the borough-wide limit would include street signs, road painting and traffic calming measures where appropriate.

Parks, open spaces and woodlands are tended by council officers, and nurtured by the borough’s many Friends’ groups, who enthusiastically dig-in.



Potholes: We've got them covered



POTHOLES
WE'VE GOT THEM **COVERED**

Haringey Council has launched a blitz to rid the borough of potholes – and we're relying on you to let us know which streets to target.

The council is pumping extra funding into its roads and pavements maintenance programme to cover the cost of banishing additional potholes following the exceptionally harsh and long winter.

Some of the borough's worst-hit streets are being completely resurfaced, while in other areas roads will be patched and potholes plugged.

The pothole intervention threshold – the depth holes have to reach before repairs are carried out – has been halved to just 25mm on main roads and 30mm on residential streets to ensure damage is dealt with before faults get out of hand. All potholes that measure more than 30mm in depth will be repaired.

Residents can report potholes using the council's dedicated hotline, via its website, by email and through Twitter using #Haringeypotholes.

A mobile app is also set to be launched this summer, making it even easier for residents to report potholes on the go.

Reported potholes will be investigated within two working days. Most will then be repaired within seven working days, while dangerous potholes will be repaired within 24 hours of being investigated.

Your efforts help beat tough targets

Huge thanks to the thousands of Haringey residents who have helped top recycling targets.

A year after the council started rolling out new waste collection services, almost one third of all rubbish in Haringey is being recycled.

Recycling rates have risen from 26 to 32 per cent, and each stage of the borough-wide rollout has encouraged more local people to recycle.

The phased rollout of the new service – which sees all recyclable waste collected every week and general waste every fortnight – began in March 2012.

By last October, all street-facing homes in the borough had moved over to the new service. Efforts to bring better collections to all housing estates are continuing, and the recycling rate is expected to rise to at least 35 per cent over the next few months.

The improved service has made it easier for everyone to recycle. The green wheelie bin provides space for all 'dry' recycling (including paper, glass, cans and plastic bottles), while lockable food bins allow leftovers to be easily recycled.

Local schools have also got in on the act, with hundreds of primary pupils taking part in a competition to design posters encouraging people to recycle more.

Increased recycling reduces carbon emissions, cuts waste and helps save money. Every tonne of rubbish thrown out costs around £80, while recycling costs just £30 per tonne.

Quentin Given, chair of Haringey Friends of the Earth, said: "It's good news that recycling rates are up as a result of the new scheme.

"We can't afford to waste resources by burying or burning them, so recycling makes good economic as well as environmental sense.

"We hope the council and Veolia will work hard with community groups to improve participation even further."

Unveiling plans for High Road West

A vibrant public space spanning the area from the new Spurs stadium to a revamped White Hart Lane Station is at the heart of exciting proposals for north-west Tottenham.

The link would form a buzzing focal point with new homes, businesses and leisure facilities surrounding the new public space – benefiting the community and making the most of increased footfall on match days, when up to 56,000 fans will flock to the area.

Under the proposals, which are now open to consultation, council tenants on the Love Lane Estate would benefit from

better and bigger homes built to meet their needs – from energy-efficient houses with gardens, to flats and maisonettes with private shared courtyards.

The council is inviting your views on three broad options for developing High Road West. The proposed area spans roughly between Coombes Croft Library and the former Cannon Rubber factory, close to the junction with the western side of Brantwood Road.

The most ambitious option for change could bring up to 1,650 quality homes, 600 jobs and 8,900m² of new open space over the next 15 years, as well as a new community and sports centre, facilities for start-up businesses, and a cinema or bowling alley.

Major improvements to White Hart Lane Station will include moving the entrance to the south, better accessibility and direct access to the new football stadium – making it easier and safer to use for both local people and visitors.

Consultation runs until Friday, June 21.

Could you change a child's life?

June sees the launch of two new specialised schemes – Parent & Child and Remand Fostering – which need more big-hearted foster carers in Haringey to open up their homes and make an amazing difference.

Both are organised through the North London Fostering Consortium, which offers specialist schemes.

Remand foster carers provide short-term care for young people aged 10-17 whilst their case is resolved in the Youth Court, allowing them to live in a family home setting rather than in secure accommodation.

Usually lasting 12-weeks, the **Parent & Child** scheme sees foster carers assess and support vulnerable parents, allowing them to live in the foster home and helping them learn how to look after their child safely.

Consortium Manager Peter Stevens (pictured above) explains: "To my knowledge, I don't know of any other five councils that have formed together to deliver fostering in this innovative way.

"We don't compete, but we do work extensively together and cooperate to achieve the best quality placements for children, young people and their carers.

"Our two latest schemes are focused on enabling a small number of children and young people to be remanded into a loving family home setting, rather than secure accommodation.

"We are also seeking new foster carers who can have a child and parent to live with them in their home and help to make assessments of both a child's needs and their

parents' abilities in relation to these.

"There's no doubt that being a foster carer for these new schemes is a demanding and full-time job.

"These specialised foster roles can pay up to £36,000 per year and we are here to offer support every step of the way.

"If you have specialist skills already, such as as a parent or youth worker, we'd be delighted to hear from you."



The North London Fostering Consortium is a partnership of five local authority fostering agencies: Barnet, Camden, Enfield, Haringey and Islington. The boroughs work together to provide the best possible service for children in care and foster carers. Working in partnership means the consortium is able to process enquiries from prospective foster carers and find new homes for children in a more efficient and timely way.

Celebrating 150 years of the 'people's park'

Haringey's famous Alexandra Palace Park marks its 150th anniversary this summer – and the whole community is invited to join the celebrations.

Community groups, local businesses and entertainers will be on hand to mark the history of the 196-acre park, first landscaped and opened as a pleasure ground in 1863.

As well becoming home to the iconic Ally Pally, the park has hosted some unique events since opening – including circuses, hot air balloon rides and even a frying pan-shaped horse racing course that operated for more than a century.

That rich legacy continues today with the park's traditional pitch-and-putt course and boating lake, as well as playing host to unconventional events such as the Red Bull Soapbox Race and Segway Rally.

As the palace prepares for a historic regeneration that will restore the venue to its former glory, the stunning park's own history will be remembered with a day of family activities and entertainment.

The park will be divided into five areas, with a bandstand on a 'village green', a sports zone with football, basketball and archery competitions, and a farmers' market amongst the attractions.

Free golf balls will be on offer to families trying out pitch-and-putt, while children can race pedalos and have a ride in a

tethered hot air balloon in a nod to the park's history.

Duncan Wilson, chief executive of the park and palace, said: "What we really hope our historic celebration will achieve is to provide everyone from all over Haringey – whether they have visited Alexandra Park before or not – with a day of free family fun.

"We want to celebrate the park's extraordinary history and exquisite parkland, which is accessible to the public all year-long, and to recognise the abundance of local talent we have around us."



Events will run from 11am-4pm on Sunday, July 21.

From Around Here



Tottenham's diverse manufacturers showcased their wares at a unique exhibition of products made in the area.



The 'From Around Here' exhibition at the newly opened 639 Enterprise Centre put local products centre stage, celebrating that Tottenham is home to companies as diverse as artisan bakers, royal uniform makers and the last remaining piano factory in London.

Fiona Scott, whose architect firm Gort Scott designed the exhibition, said: "It's been really exciting to find so many unique and interesting things being made here.

"It's impressive to hear the stories of some of the businesses, who have worked incredibly hard to

make their businesses successful – there's a real mix of artisan and traditional firms still going strong."

The extraordinary array of businesses tucked away in the area's thriving industrial areas have been catalogued in a 'yellow pages' of Tottenham, which is available to pick up at 639 High Road.

Among those featured is quilting experts Louis Moreau, who have been expertly crafting in Tottenham since the 1930s, adorning the bedrooms of Queen Elizabeth II, Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands and Chelsea FC owner Roman Abramovich.

Changes to policing in your community

From later this month, the Mayor of London's Office for Policing and Crime (MOPAC) will roll out its new plan for how neighbourhood policing will work – both in Haringey and across London.

The biggest difference to local policing will be in the ways in which you're able to have face-to-face contact with police officers.

Instead of front counters, the MOPAC plan includes proposals to set up new "contact points" with officers in the community.

The contact points will be scattered across the borough, in convenient locations such as local supermarkets, with each point running for between one and two hours each week.

MOPAC has pledged to unveil full details of contact points soon, and to review the contact points to make sure they're working effectively.

Tottenham will be the only place in the borough with a 24-hour police station front counter service. Hornsey police station and Fishmongers Arms police station on Wood Green High Road will each be open on weekdays only, while Muswell Hill police station's front counter is set to close completely.

Other key changes include:

- Tottenham's existing police station on the High Road will move to a new location later this summer. Final details are being ironed out.
- Police have committed to more frontline officers for the borough, but there will be fewer safer neighbourhoods officers in each ward.
- MOPAC has pledged to invest more money in targeted projects such as tackling gangs; supporting victims of crime, and reducing reoffending rates, particularly among young offenders.



Men's Health Week in Haringey

It may sound like a cliché, but it's a sad fact that men often shy away from talking about their health.

Here in Haringey, it's a burning issue. Many men in the borough have a lower than average life expectancy and too many suffer cardiovascular disease – which means a higher risk of heart attack, stroke, high blood pressure and diabetes.

Many of us know men who have ignored symptoms, balked at the idea of a diet and considered the walk to work enough exercise.

Men's Health Week (June 12-16) will be a chance to encourage men to get in touch with their bodies and change their lifestyles for the better.

For volunteer health champion Steve Dunkley, 44, getting men chatting about health is a daily goal. After suffering his own health issues, including the onset of diabetes and losing a male cousin to cancer, he responded to a call for 'Lifesavers' programme volunteers.

Steve was trained to talk about early detection of cancers to his peers in settings like community events, festivals, GPs surgeries and in his day-to-day life.

He explains: "Men often have the mentality that bad things won't happen to them, but we can gently challenge that and make sure they know where they can go to talk about any problems they're having.

"There are some brilliant services in Haringey designed especially for men – things like the weight management programme and testicular and prostate cancer screening.

"I have definitely changed my own lifestyle since doing Lifesavers – getting a healthy diet and plenty of exercise is so important for controlling my diabetes, but if I had started sooner I might have avoided the disease.

"That's the most powerful message to be honest – you can prevent so many diseases with small changes. If I can get walking, and more importantly talking, I think any man can."

The New River – celebrating 400 years

Opened in September 1613 by the Lord Mayor, the New River was a huge feat of engineering, bringing fresh water to London as a substitute for the polluted waters of the Thames.

Although only 20 miles as the crow flies, the New River originally flowed for almost 40 miles in a hand-dug, clay-lined channel along a route starting in Hertfordshire and ending in Islington – passing through Alexandra Park, Wood Green, Hornsey, Harringay and Finsbury Park.

The opening pageant was recreated in 1913 to celebrate 300 years of the New River (pictured).

Entrepreneur Hugh Myddelton got the New River project off the ground back in 1609, persuading the king to allow access to build on his royal estate at Theobald's Palace.

The first few decades were not without problems. There was a great deal of "dipping" for water without payment, dead dogs and such thrown into its supposedly fresh water, and many complaints about the state of the banks.

By 1722, the river was fenced in and it was only with the opening of the New River Path in the year 2000 that the public was again allowed access to its banks.

In 1859, the Victorians shortened and straightened the New River, removing huge loops. In Wood Green, place and street names reveal the river's original course: Rivulet Road, New River Sports Centre, and River Park House at the

corner of High Road and Station Road.

In 1986, local opposition defeated plans by Thames Water to close the New River course south of the M25, which would have led to it drying up.

Today, despite investment in Thames Water's underground ring main, the Thames does not supply enough water to meet the demands of London's ever increasing population, and so the New River still forms an important part of our water supply.

The 400th anniversary will see the New River Action Group lead celebratory walks and give talks to groups along the New River, including at Bruce Castle this month and at the Hornsey Historical Society next February.


