

In the last edition of Haringey People, I briefly touched on the role that you can play in helping to make Haringey an even better place to live, work, study and visit.

I am determined that as a council we do all we can to support, empower, enable and work alongside our communities to enrich our borough. We want to ensure that local people are at the heart of driving forward improvements in their neighbourhoods, and that you feel able to play a part in your community.

We know that traditional local meetings are not always well attended and that people are keen to get involved in other ways. That's why in the coming weeks we'll be exploring in detail how we can find new and better ways of engaging and working with Haringey's residents, businesses and partners – and giving local people a greater stake in community projects.

We're looking at a number of approaches for working in partnership with you, and will be producing a wide-ranging community strategy that will map out the support available to you to do more to improve your neighbourhood, such as volunteering, leading community initiatives, and shaping regeneration schemes.

We're also considering introducing ward budgets, which could see small funding pots allocated to each of Haringey's 19 local wards and residents invited to help choose where the money should be spent. If the scheme goes ahead, it would be an opportunity for ward councillors to work with local communities to decide which ideas, projects and activities to fund.

I'm proud of the wealth of talent that we have here in Haringey, and of the significant resources and assets that we have in our communities and in our neighbourhoods. I want to make sure we make the most of these and I look forward to working with you to support the future of our borough.

Introducing your new Members of Parliament

Haringey has two new Members of Parliament following last month's General Election.

David Lammy (Labour) was re-elected MP for Tottenham, while Catherine West (Labour) was elected MP for Hornsey & Wood Green.

Voter registration reached more than 150,000 across the borough – more than 70,000 in Tottenham and 79,000 in Hornsey and Wood Green – as local residents flocked to sign up in time to have their say.

On polling day, turnout in Hornsey and Wood Green was more than 70 per cent, while in Tottenham it topped 60 per cent.

Ledley's Lancasterian games area launch

Spurs legend Ledley King took to the pitch to unveil a dazzling new games area at Lancasterian Primary School.

The Tottenham Hotspur ambassador cut the ribbon to declare the multi-use games area (MUGA) open before signing autographs, chatting to pupils and even stepping on to the pitch to referee a couple of football matches.

Year 6 pupil Burhan Ahmed told Ledley: "You have inspired me to become defender."

The state-of-the-art MUGA will be used by pupils at the school in Kings Road, Tottenham, for games ranging from football and basketball to netball and tennis.

School staff hope the fantastic facility will boost pupils' fitness and help them to fine-tune their sporting skills. The MUGA will also be available out of school hours for hire by community groups and local residents.

Mental health support

Additional funding to support people with mental illness to find and keep employment has been secured for Haringey.

The £1.3 million Individual Placement Support (IPS) scheme will be targeted at five local areas, helping people with long-term mental illness into work. It will be provided by employment experts within community mental health teams, working closely with clinical staff.

IPS has been shown to significantly increase job prospects, while research shows that finding work can be a key factor in helping people to recover from mental illness.





New Mayor proud to serve “fantastic” Haringey

Haringey’s new Mayor has spoken of the great honour of serving as the borough’s first citizen in Haringey’s 50th year.

Cllr Jennifer Mann, who represents Hornsey ward, donned the ceremonial chains for the first time at a special “mayor making” ceremony at Alexandra Palace last month.

Cllr Mann, who takes over from outgoing Mayor Cllr Kaushika Amin, was ushered into office in front of a packed crowd following a performance from Haringey’s talented young musicians.

She told guests: “I feel very fortunate to have the distinction of serving as Mayor in a year where the borough is marking its 50th anniversary.

“Haringey is a fantastic borough, and I feel that our story is often undersold.

“We have the world on our doorstep, the strength of which is shown in the incredible diversity and warmth of our communities and energy of our neighbourhoods.

“It is a place where people pull together, where people support each other, and I am greatly looking forward to seeing this first-hand in my mayoral year.”

Cllr Mann has chosen local charity All People All Places – which supports vulnerable and homeless people – as her official Mayoral charity.

High Road heritage

A £1.5million Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) grant will restore some of Tottenham High Road’s historic shop fronts.

The project will see external repairs and the restoration of historic features, with apprentices offered the chance to learn valuable period restoration skills by working on the scheme.

The project is part of the council’s commitment to celebrating heritage and improving Tottenham High Road as regeneration takes shape.

Summer splash for Lido

The newly-renovated Park Road Lido is set for a summer of fun with longer opening hours and brand new facilities.

The historic pool will be open for early bird swimming from 7am, with fun sessions from 9am to 6pm and evening dips on offer from 6-8pm.

An £8million investment by Fusion Lifestyle, which manages leisure facilities on behalf of the council, has seen new changing rooms, sun loungers and water features, amongst other improvements.

Teen pregnancy drop

A dedicated drive to tackle teenage pregnancy has seen rates in the borough fall by 37 per cent in just one year. Haringey has more than halved its total teen pregnancy rate since 2009.

Information released by the Office for National Statistics shows that conception rates at under-16 and under-18 in Haringey are now below London and national averages.

The fall comes after the council worked with young people and the community to develop new approaches to tackling teenage pregnancy, including a sexual health advice app, workshops, training courses and increased access to contraception and sexual health services.

School improvements underway

Major improvements are underway at three Haringey schools, bringing new facilities, modernised classrooms and better provision for special educational needs.

Riverside Secondary, Belmont Infants and the Vale will enjoy new facilities, with Riverside extended to provide additional space for music and art; an improved main school entrance at Belmont, and new facilities including teaching space and therapy rooms at the Vale.

Work started last month and should all be wrapped up by November.

New school places

Two of Haringey's popular primary schools will be welcoming even more pupils after expansion plans were given the green light.

St Mary's CofE Primary, Rectory Gardens, Hornsey, and Bounds Green Infant and Junior School, Bounds Green Road, will each see an additional form of entry.

The St Mary's expansion will bring new classrooms, a studio and food technology areas, as well as additional funding for children with special needs.

At Bounds Green, there will be extra classrooms and study spaces, new toilets and a re-landscaped playground.

20mph starts this summer

The introduction of a 20mph speed limit on most of Haringey's residential roads is set to go ahead this summer.

The change will reduce the speed limit on residential streets and some roads with schools, but not on major roads and routes through the borough.

New road signs will highlight where the speed limit applies.

Summer of fun for Finsbury Park

From community events to family fun days and music festivals, Finsbury Park is set for a busy summer.

Activities such as a running event, cycling festival, sponsored walk and funfairs will rub shoulders with major events including the Wireless Festival on the weekend of July 3, and other concerts.

All money raised from events at Finsbury Park is ploughed into improvements in parks across the borough, with the council committing hundreds of thousands of pounds for projects including better lighting and paths and new sports facilities.

In Finsbury Park, the volleyball and basketball courts will be upgraded and will

remain free to use, while the tennis courts are also in line for future improvements.

All events at Finsbury Park are subject to strict conditions that restrict noise levels and cover clean-up costs.

Major events such as Wireless are regularly patrolled and there will be a complaints hotline in operation throughout.

Fly-tipper caught on camera

A woman who was captured on CCTV emptying wheelie bins into someone else's garden has been forced to fork out more than £200.

Linda Bivolaru of Carew Road, Tottenham, was spotted with another woman unloading two bins over the wall of a garden next to Haringey Council's recycling centre in Park View Road, Tottenham.

The council released the CCTV footage and carried out door-to-door enquiries in a bid to track down the women. When confronted, they admitted dumping the rubbish but claimed they thought it was allowed after seeing other people do the same thing.

Tottenham Magistrates' Court fined Ms Bivolaru £110 and ordered her to pay £100 costs and a £20 victim surcharge.

Have a Play Streets Summer

Hundreds of Haringey kids could be playing out this summer as the Play Streets scheme looks set to take off again.

Play Streets allows local roads to be shut to traffic for a day to give children the chance to play in the street, and neighbours the chance to get to know each other better.

Neighbours volunteer as "stewards" for the event, ensuring that any cars that need to come and go do so at just five miles per hour.

Haringey Play Association is supporting the scheme, which is

backed by the council. Applications to shut residential roads must be made to the council but there is no fee for Play Streets.

Tip-top transformation for Tottenham Green

People passing through Tottenham Green this summer will be greeted with a beautiful spot to stop a while following a £1.5million refurbishment.

Extensive improvements to the green were shaped by the ideas of local residents, traders and councillors, who worked with the Prince's Foundation and architects Adams and Sutherland to design the new-look.

Highlights of the work include new paths, benches and lighting; more space to relax; a new playground; re-landscaping of the green; reduced traffic, and special floodlights to showcase historic buildings including Tottenham Town Hall.



Haringey loves libraries

Haringey People takes a closer look at plans for the borough's libraries.

Two of Haringey's most popular local libraries are set for starring roles at the heart of their communities with extra services on offer, while neighbourhood libraries are also in line for improvements.

Haringey Council's commitment to keeping and improving all nine of the borough's libraries will see extra services and activities made available at Wood Green Central and Marcus Garvey libraries.

In addition to enjoying usual library services, visitors will be able to carry out simple customer service tasks such as buying parking permits, applying for benefits or getting information. Both libraries will also be refurbished, with ageing equipment upgraded or replaced.

While extra services will be available at the libraries, making better use of space will ensure current services on offer can continue.

Further plans to improve Haringey's local neighbourhood libraries to make them more appealing to visitors will be unveiled soon.

Historic restoration to secure Alexandra Palace's future

The long-awaited restoration of Alexandra Palace has taken a huge leap forward after a landmark renovation scheme landed almost £19million from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The grant – along with almost £7million support from Haringey Council and additional fundraising cash – will be ploughed into a groundbreaking project to refurbish the palace's Victorian Theatre, transform the former BBC studios and repair and open the currently out-of-bounds East Court.

Alexandra Palace's beautiful hidden theatre – first opened in 1875 – will be brought back into use as a 1,000-seat venue for performances, cinema, comedy, music, rehearsal space and community and commercial use.

The BBC studios – hailed as the birthplace of high-definition television broadcasts in 1936 – will be reborn as an interactive museum, with access to archives and educational tours.

Ambitious plans won backing from more than 2,000 people, including local residents and restoration experts such as English Heritage, the Theatres Trust and the Victorian Society.

Alexandra Palace outgoing Chief Executive Duncan Wilson said: "The Heritage Lottery Fund grant is a hugely positive and significant step in realising aspirations to bring the Victorian Theatre and BBC Studios back to life and fulfil the potential of the palace and its remarkable history – both for the local community and for visitors from all over London, the UK and overseas."

Heritage Lottery Fund Chief Executive Carole Souter said: "Alexandra Palace has played a pivotal role in the development of popular entertainment – culminating in the birth of British television.

"The eastern end has stood derelict for 35 years but now lottery funding is heralding a new chapter for this iconic building, creating an inspirational space where people can learn about its rich and colourful history."

Making a Difference: Haringey's unique Brook Special School scoops outstanding status

The ground-breaking The Brook primary special school has earned the highest accolade from independent education experts Ofsted after they were bowled over by its excellent achievement and exceptional pupils.

The Brook, which opened on Broadwater Farm less than four years ago, joins an ever-growing list of Haringey schools to be rated 'Outstanding' by Ofsted after getting top marks in every criteria, including achievement of pupils; quality of teaching; behaviour and safety of pupils, and early years provision.

Ofsted's inspectors heaped praise on The Brook's pupils, both for their behaviour and achievement, with their report reading: "Pupils' behaviour is outstanding.

"This is because pupils' listening and development skills are developed exceptionally well in all lessons by all staff.

Consequently, they develop excellent social skills," and: "All pupils make outstanding progress from low starting points because they are exceptionally well taught."

Ofsted also highlighted the benefits of inclusive practice between The Brook and neighbouring Willow School saying: "Leaders take every opportunity for pupils in the Brook and Willow Schools to learn together through joint activities in music, dance, art and culture, ensuring they are well prepared for life in modern Britain."

The Brook teaches children with a range of complex needs, including those on the autistic spectrum and children with conditions such as cerebral palsy, epilepsy and sensory impairment and profound and multiple learning difficulties.

Margaret Sumner, Headteacher at The Brook said: "We are absolutely delighted with the report.

"It is a real tribute to the passionate commitment shown by the senior leaders; governors; all staff; the multidisciplinary teams, and parents and carers that has ensured that pupils are not only fully involved in the wider inclusive learning community, but that their achievement and learning within that community is absolutely outstanding."

Congratulations to everyone involved in The Brook's success story.

Clean sweep for Haringey

Community spirit sparked in Haringey as volunteers from across the borough joined forces to clean up their neighbourhoods.

Residents and traders picked up their brooms and got stuck in to giving their neighbourhood a thorough spring clean during Community Clear Up Day.

On the Sandlings Estate, Wood Green, volunteers from the Sandlings Gardening Club helped the council and Veolia to clear overgrown foliage and remove unsightly items including a dumped mattress.

Volunteers from the Sandlings Estate Gardening Club said: "Residents care about the area they live in and wanted to join in the clear up.

"The area looks tidier, cleaner and the clean up is a way of stopping rough sleepers sleeping in the bushes and stopping people tipping their rubbish into the bedding area.

"When other people see residents involved they tend to show more respect for the area.

"Residents from other roads nearby have remarked on how much better it looks and how much safer they feel walking past the area at night."

At Palace Gates Road, Alexandra Palace, traders worked together with Veolia to clear litter and waste from side pathways and rear entrances to create a more pleasant shopping environment.

And in Myddleton Road, Bounds Green, a group of volunteers carried out a clean up to leave the street neat and tidy ready for the Sunday market the following day.

Community Clear Up Day was a national event that saw volunteers around the country join forces to tidy up their local area.

Elsewhere, volunteers from the Finsbury Park Mosque were among people from Haringey, Hackney and Islington who helped pick up litter during an event dubbed Capital Clean Up.

The Haringey side of Stroud Green Road and Seven Sisters Road saw a deep clean and in total two tonnes of rubbish was cleared by staff from all three boroughs.

Harringay Gardens was also left gleaming at a separate event led by charity Clean Up UK, with local people also turning out to lend a hand.

'I'm Tottenham material'

Doyin's journey from speech to stage and screen

Doyin Ayiboye had never liked speaking in front of people. So when her teacher asked her to give a speech at school about something she cared about, she wasn't keen.

"I've never enjoyed doing speeches," she explains, "but I felt like I did have something interesting to say."

Fast forward six months and - after performing her monologue about why she's proud to be from Tottenham to a packed audience at a national competition at Piccadilly Theatre - Doyin felt more confident.

The 16-year-old said: "It was scary because there were judges there, but because I was saying something I'd thought through and believed in, when I came off stage I couldn't believe how calm I was."

After Doyin's speech got uploaded onto Facebook, one of her youth theatre directors suggested making it into a video filmed in Tottenham.

The resulting film, *Tottenham Material*, sees Doyin speak passionately about how media stereotypes of her community and young people affect how the people she meets perceive her - and why they're wrong.

She lists international megastar Adele and one of Britain's first black MPs, Bernie Grant, as inspirational examples.

The former Bruce Grove Primary School pupil says: "People think I must be like this and that because I'm from Tottenham."

"But just because you have a set opinion of Tottenham, it doesn't mean you should judge me based on that - why don't you get to know me and who I am first?"

Leading directors awarded Doyin's "sincere" video first prize in a film competition led by the What I See Project - a global initiative to inspire young women to achieve their potential key.

And now Doyin, whose tutor at Islington Community Theatre says is "incredibly

hard-working", will be performing in a new play at the National Theatre in July, and is planning to study drama and theatre at college.

"I have no idea of what I want to do," she adds, "but I went to school in Tottenham, I grew up in Tottenham."

"There's such a great community here full of people from all different backgrounds."

"I'm Tottenham material - why can't I be successful too?"

Protecting Bowes Park's heritage high street



As one of Haringey's most beautiful shopping streets enjoys a revival, one of the challenges is to ensure its character is protected as new businesses open their doors.

A new project on Myddleton Road, Bowes Park, is celebrating Haringey's heritage through careful restoration of the shop fronts of four of the arcade's ornate buildings – returning them to their elegant original designs.

The impressive results highlight the heritage and architecture of the area as the activities inside its buildings have evolved from the butchers and bakers of days gone by to today's start-up successes.

Funded by Haringey Council, English Heritage and local traders, the first shops to benefit include fashion designers at 123 Myddleton Road, Andy's Dry Cleaners at 124 and the Pro Cancer Research Fund at 126.

Nadia Youssouf runs The Hub, Bowes Park, which has also undergone a transformation. She says the shabby-turned-spectacular shop fronts are having a domino effect along the high street.

"A new trader that has just opened up has made sure his shop front is in keeping with the new ones," says Nadia. "And I know that other people down the road are doing the

same thing – so it's had an effect on the whole street."

The Hub is just one example of the community-led resurgence of Myddleton Road, and runs activities ranging from children's jazz and yoga in the morning to adult learning and exercise classes in the evening.

Nadia, whose parents ran their building firm from the premises for 18 years, adds: "The new shop front looks gorgeous and it makes such a difference to the building. The colour is beautiful and bright and reflects what's going on inside."

Andy Pедиou, whose dry cleaning store has been keeping locals' clothes squeaky clean for 22 years, said all of his regular customers had praised the "beautiful" new shop front. He added: "I'm very happy with it – I think it's perfect and it looks much better than before.

"If the shops look good and new ones are opening up it breathes new life into Myddleton Road, and there will be more people shopping here."

Nadia agrees: "Myddleton Road is changing, and I think everyone on this street wants it to become what it has the potential to be – a real success."



Celebrating 50 years of the London Borough of Haringey

This summer sees Haringey's golden anniversary. Haringey People takes a look at some of the highlights of Haringey's history and what's in store for the Haringey @50 celebrations.

1965 – Haringey is born when the London Government Act brings together the municipal boroughs of Hornsey, Tottenham and Wood Green.

1973 – New River Sports Centre is opened. Many Olympic medal winners will go on to use the facilities, including Lord Sebastian Coe, Heather Hunte and Daley Thompson.

1974 – Wood Green Central Library is transformed. The library is one of London's most popular.

1970s-1980s – floods at Broad Lane, Green Lanes and Wood Green High Road force the council's Flooding Operations Team into action.

1980 – Haringey Council acquires Alexandra Palace from the GLC. That July, fire tears through the building. Repair works see the Great Hall – still the heart of the Palace today – transformed.

1985 – Bernie Grant is elected leader of Haringey, the first black council leader in the country. Mr Grant would go on to be elected MP for Tottenham.

1986 – Diana, Princess of Wales, opens Markfield Community Centre, offering a space for disabled and non-disabled children to play together.

1990 – Nelson Mandela pays a visit to Haringey following his release from prison in South Africa. There was huge support for the Anti-Apartheid movement in Haringey.







Inside Wood Green's most purrfect property

Ninety-one years ago, Louisa Snow opened an animal refuge at a small house in Wood Green after becoming concerned about the growing number of abandoned and injured animals on London's streets after the First World War.

Today, her vision lives on through a dedicated team of volunteers at the expanded centre in Lordship Lane, run by Wood Green, The Animals Charity.

From the street, the centre looks like any other home, but the doors open to reveal a fully-fledged veterinary centre – complete with operating theatre, pens for poorly felines and plenty of space for animals to play.

It is in these unusual surroundings that the team cares for rescued cats, performs life-saving surgery and gives a temporary home to some of Haringey's cutest inhabitants.

But centre manager Caroline Johnson explains how the charity's focus has shifted from simply rescuing and rehoming the capital's stray cats to getting out into the community to prevent problems before they arise.

She says: "We changed our approach last year to be proactive out in the community and help educate people about their pets – from doing worming MOTs to health check-ups.

"We've also started doing talks in Haringey's schools, giving a 15-minute education to children about pets and animals, and what it means to have a pet.

"The reaction from the community has been hugely positive, and we've had loads of people coming to our sessions; it's really taking off."

With the charity funded only through donations, Caroline says it's vital that the

centre works with the local community to help them care for animals, identify problem hotspots and educate the public on how to care for their pets to stop ill-treatment and poor health.

She added: "We're in desperate need of cat fosterers to take on pregnant mums-to-be and look after kittens until they're eight weeks old.

"And we get lots of calls from people telling us where noisy packs of cats are mating, which helps us neuter them and control the population."

New police team makes its mark

“ This is a great opportunity to tackle borough-wide problems and really focus on a particular problem for an extended period. ”

These are the words of Police Constable Kate Hopkin, the youngest member of a new team dedicated to helping both the police and council tackle local crime issues across Haringey.

The Partnership Policing Team brings together six new officers, who are deployed across the borough as an additional boost to existing police numbers.

The extra bobbies on the beat were secured as part of a “buy one, get one free” deal, with three funded by the council and three more by the Mayor’s Office for Policing and Crime.

They are moved around the borough according to need and have been spotted in Hornsey, Muswell Hill, Wood Green and Tottenham since arriving earlier this year.

At the time of going to print, their haul of 48 arrests had included a team of robbers who stole an iPhone and cash from two schoolboys in Muswell Hill; a burglar who carried out several distraction burglaries in Hornsey, and numerous arrests of drug dealers around Ducketts Common.

Working with the council’s enforcement officers, the team has also seized thousands of pounds worth of alcohol, which was being sold from unlicensed premises, and counterfeit fragrances and handbags being sold in some Tottenham shops.

The officers have also assisted in the closure of fast food outlets found to be breaking food hygiene or waste regulations, and they joined the council and electricity companies on visits to premises suspected of dangerously bypassing electricity meters.

PC Hopkins, who joined the team following two years with the Muswell Hill Safer Neighbourhood Team, said: “It is a much more proactive role than SNT, and working with council officers has given me a whole new perspective on the issues in Haringey.

“Hopefully we can continue to make a positive impact for the rest of the year and into future years.”





Solving a puzzle for autism awareness

We can think of worse places to do a jigsaw than the scenic slopes of Alexandra Palace, which is exactly where students from Heartlands High School marked World Autism Awareness Week.

As part of the school's 'Celebrating Differences, Together' project, 36 students each designed a jigsaw piece to reflect their interests and celebrate their uniqueness. The pieces were put together to reveal a multi-coloured collage depicting everything from pet guinea pigs to favourite football teams.

Year 8 pupil Honey-May said: "I've painted a picture of a rainbow and added gold and glitter. It's the best thing I've ever drawn and I think I will be doing more drawing after this."

Fellow pupil Terry explained why his piece contained a depiction of the American Stars and Stripes flag:

"Everyone in school thinks I speak like I'm from America, so I decided to paint the American flag on my piece as a joke. I'm actually from Nigeria and Hungary. Maybe a mix of those two makes you sound like you're American."

The project brought together Heartlands' mainstream and specialist students as Sophia Hutchings, Acting Director of Autism Provision at Heartlands school explained:

"This project celebrates individuals altogether. Inclusion and independence are at the heart of everything we do, so giving mainstream and specialist students the chance to work together on a common goal is really important.


"Producing the puzzle pieces has been a very structured process and the students loved making them."

From next September, Heartlands will increase the number of places available to autistic children after the trust that runs the school won permission to build a new specialist school.

The purpose-built Heartlands Autism School in Haringey will admit up to 104 children aged 4-19 years old and will work with local employers to ensure pupils acquire life skills, as well as academic qualifications.

Sophia added: "Transitions are extremely difficult for children with autism, so reducing them and having specialist teaching that develops independence from an early age is a real benefit."

The 36 jigsaw pieces were displayed in school before being auctioned, with proceeds going to the National Autistic Society.

Just what the pharmacist prescribed

Haringey residents now have easier access to a host of handy health services following the launch of the Healthy Living Pharmacies programme.

The scheme sees services including stop smoking support, sexual health, needle exchange and healthy start vitamins available for the first time at pharmacies across the borough.

Sexual health services previously offered to under-25s have been expanded to allow services – including testing and treatment for sexually transmitted infections, point-of-care HIV testing and contraception provision, advice and support – to be accessed by all residents.

Healthy Living Pharmacies are also able to offer vitamins to pregnant and breastfeeding women and children through the healthy start vitamins scheme, and to help residents trying to quit smoking by offering on-site help such as nicotine replacement and motivational support.

In areas where Healthy Living Pharmacies are already up and running, the scheme has been shown to improve residents' health and wellbeing and reduce the strain on GPs and other medical services.

Virginia Duran, Pharmacy Manager at Morrison's Pharmacy, one of Haringey's first Healthy living Pharmacies said: "We need to make sure people know that we are there for them.

"We do so much more than giving out prescriptions, we are so accessible. We're an untapped resource for the NHS.

"I had a customer come in on our first day as a Healthy Living Pharmacy who came to me and said 'I'm really worried about this' and I could say 'don't worry you don't need to go to the doctor, you don't need to go to the sexual health clinic, you can get an HIV test here'.

"He was so relieved he could do it in the pharmacy, he came back a few days later and gave me a box of chocolates."

As part of the Healthy Living Pharmacies programme, pharmacy staff also receive additional training to help them answer questions from the public and signpost people to the most appropriate forms of support.

Celebrating half a century of Hornsey book worms

For 50 years, Hornsey Library has stood at the heart of its community – helping residents to quench their thirst for knowledge and providing a place to learn, play and meet.

This year hundreds of people flocked to the popular community hub to wish it happy birthday as it marked half a century not out and celebrated with tours, a special film screening, live music and a tribute book that captured the memories of thousands of visitors.

Hornsey Library was built as the new central library for Hornsey Borough Council and was the last building to be built by the municipal borough before

Hornsey was incorporated into what we now know as the London Borough of Haringey.

The site had been ear-marked for a library for a long time and the design at the time was described as “functional and contemporary”, with the building intended to appear and feel spacious even at the busiest times.

Architects Mr F. Ley and Mr G.F.S. Jarvis worked closely with the borough librarian, Mr W.B. Stevenson and his deputy, Mr Surridge to make the new building as practical and user-friendly as possible.

Hornsey Library was opened, to much fanfare, by HRH Princess Alexandra

on March 5 1965, when dozens of local people flocked to try out the new state-of-the-art facility.

The library was awarded Grade II listed status in 2001 and, along with Hornsey Town Hall and the war memorial at Hornsey Central Hospital, is one of three listed structures in the area.

The library continues to be as popular as ever with visitors and still boasts an original bronze sculpture and a beautiful engraved window designed to commemorate Hornsey Borough’s diamond jubilee.


