<b>Presentation</b>	The document reads well and is much clearer in the section on open space provision in Haringey. Nice use of pictures and maps.	It is important, in such a public-facing document, to make sure 'the reader' is informed for example can we assume 'the reader' will know who Robert de Bruce was?  Are Images 1 and 19 meant to be the same?  4.7 refers to Albert park.  2.2 facilities says there is 53326m of Grass. 8.2 tells me there is 3.6 ha, figures included need to be consistent.
<b>Health, Safety &amp; Security</b>	Good section, aware of issues. Plan contains a comprehensive synopsis on the core objectives and actions to promote public safety and wellbeing.	Designing out crime 5.8: Make sure the plan is regularly reviewed to include any new initiatives in this park, this could be a reference saying 'we have

		cut down.....” or “ we have put in lights..” etc. In order to highlight any issues and actions to manage risk and promote public safety.
<b>Maintenance of equipment, buildings &amp; landscape</b>	Plan contains a good summary of the core priorities and actions to maintain the required standards for grounds maintenance and how these are both monitored and improved e.g., Trees have regular inspections and good schedules for litter picking and horticulture maintenance.	The plan could be clearer as to why it has 4 classifications of service standards, perhaps this could be simplified to just acceptable or reducing this down to 2 classifications.  It would be useful to understand where this Park sits in the borough wide KPI's perhaps breaking it down to this area or zone?  Not sure at 12 if the plan needs the table about inspections, as this was picked up in the reading of the plan. It is useful to know how they are maintained and to what outcomes and standards.
<b>Litter, cleanliness, vandalism</b>	A good overview of the core actions and protocols to address litter and waste, and a good response to deal with issues like graffiti. Schedule appears to be good	Important challenges such as the location, type and design of litter bins, or methods to prevent or deal with graffiti, can be included in the plan as these develop, along with evaluating their outcomes and impacts.
<b>Environmental Management</b>	A very good description of a range of appropriate techniques and methods to reduce the park's impact upon the environment, and maximise use of sustainable resources.	New techniques or tools to increase sustainability on site will arise through the lifetime of the plan, and if they are applied to the site this can be reflected in it, along with assessments of how they work and what benefits they have had.

<b>Community Involvement</b>	Good community involvement. A very good summary of who is involved in the management and development of the park, and what their functions and capabilities are. The major comment would be that there appears to be very little aspiration for the park bearing in mind that 900,000 people visit the park each year to use its many facilities. I understand that this is difficult whilst you go through restructure and austerity, but there needs to be something for the space to aspire to.

<b>Community Involvement</b>	<p>An excellent Friends group that has obviously invested (and continues to) a great deal of time and effort into the Park grounds holding regular events (music and theatre) throughout the year to promote educational and health benefits around the Park.</p> <p>The Friends of Park Forum Group (an independent network for the 45 local Friends groups of Haringey residents) work closely with Haringey Council in order to protect and improve the Park.</p> <p>A Health initiative take place in the park each year called Parkrun where GPs, practice staff and patients walk, run and volunteer at the park. This is seen as a way to improve health and wellbeing and for everyone to get involved with the local community.</p> <p>During the visit we spoke to Community Safety Officers PC Uddin and PC Michael who carry out regular patrolling of the park and attend the cross park meetings with the Friends of Park Forum Group.</p> <p>Carol Hebbs, runs 'T On The Green Café ' Which also offers guided walks, party and hire services to the local community.</p> <p>Over the summer months the park offers a free paddling pool and water play facilities.</p>	<p>The park managers, and Officers demonstrated clear management and engagement objectives with all users and local community groups.</p> <p>It would be valuable to see some information/data on how the Council have engaged with users of different ethnicities and those with disabilities.</p> <p>Regular input from the community is essential to maintain local support.</p>
<b>Marketing and Communication</b>	Well publicised locally and well known in the area.

<b>Management</b>	<p>The Park managers manage the functional areas of the park and demonstrated not only passion but support and knowledge around community involvement in line with the Councils 2023 strategic vision report details recommended approaches where people can lead active and healthy lives in an environment that is safe, clean and green.</p> <p>Although budgets have been affected by austerity the Park hosts a number of local organisations that lease their buildings/assets with the aim of independently sustaining their green space. For example the Pavilion Sports lease the sports pavilion and tennis courts from Haringey Council. They offer an excellent selection of coaching sessions for adults and children.</p>	<p>The Councils strategic vision report has a strong focus on fundraising and maximising the commercial potential of the site based on public benefit, heritage and ecological value.</p>
