Last year, we launched a plan that set out our aims and ambitions for Haringey over the next three years. One year in, I'm pleased we have made a great deal of progress but there are five areas we are focusing on to improve the quality of life for everyone in Haringey.

1. Education

Nearly all Haringey schools are good or outstanding and I'm determined to drive up standards so every child gets the best start in life. In September the Ada National College for Digital Skills opens in Tottenham to train young people in the latest digital skills and there are plans to open a London Academy School of Excellence which will help provide some of the best post-16 education in London.

2. Skills

The world's economy is changing with huge growth in technology, science, engineering and computing jobs. The Science, Technology, Education and Maths (STEM) commission I set up last year will make recommendations in July about how we can give children the skills they need to succeed.

3. More jobs and homes

You'll see big changes happening in Tottenham Hale, Tottenham High Road and Northumberland Park as the new Spurs stadium takes shape. In September we'll unveil proposals to transform Wood Green and we are lobbying Sadiq Khan to deliver Crossrail2 to Seven Sisters, Wood Green and New Southgate to ensure local people benefit from new jobs and homes and a brand new rail link.

4. Your neighbourhood

Some say Haringey is there to clean up after those who drop litter and fly-tip rubbish. We are not. Every penny spent on clearing up fly-tipping (£3 million a year) would be better spent on our older residents, libraries or parks. I'm determined to ensure the tiny minority of irresponsible people know their irresponsible behaviour will not be tolerated.

5. Social care and health

With the right advice and support we can help more older people to live independently and stay in control of their own lives. Two new developments (Lorenco and Protheroe House in Tottenham) will mean 100 older residents can live independently in their homes. We are working hard to ensure every resident can live a healthy, long and fulfilling life.

Despite the 40 per cent government funding cut, Haringey will never be in the business of managing decline. I believe the changes we are making will improve the quality of life for our residents and make Haringey one of the best places in London to live, work or set up a business.

The Rise of a Social Media Entrepreneur

Social media is the easiest way to reach billions of people to share information. If you wanted to find out the best way to make sure your eye brows were on 'fleck', re-upholster a chair or even change a setting on your phone, you'd go straight to the Internet wouldn't you?

A new world of social media entrepreneurs from beauty gurus to gamers are vlogging all the way to the bank. One of Haringey's top social media entrepreneurs is 28-year old, Rachael Sealy. Hailing from Bounds Green, Rachael has over 30,000 subscribers across Instagram, YouTube, Periscope, Facebook, Snapchat and Twitter. We sat down with Rachael to find out more.



What is Ukafralista about?

I promote natural afro hair, beauty, lifestyle and fashion. It's a bit of everything that pertains mostly to black women, because my purpose for doing this is to give black women in the UK somewhere to look that reflects what they're about and what they look like.

How did you get started as a blogger/vlogger?

I've been blogging for eight years but have been doing it professionally full-time for two years. I started out as a fashion student and after I graduated, and started my own label, I would document what I was doing. Then people became more interested in me, how I did my hair and beauty and stuff like that. At first, I wasn't really sure of it until I looked on YouTube and realised it was a thing!

What advice would you give someone wanting to start a YouTube channel?

Have a concept, or a purpose for why you're doing it, stay true to yourself. What's your angle? What's going to make you stand out? Is it your content, the way you edit or film it? What makes you unique? And finally, have fun with it, don't take it too seriously.

What is the process of actually making the videos?

I try to do at least two videos a week, they go up on a Tuesday, Wednesday or a Sunday. I record in my room, setting up my lighting and camera. I do a test video and record twice to see which one looks better, but there's a lot that goes into the final product from editing to rendering to making sure the title is catchy.

How has YouTube helped you?

YouTube has been a platform for me to establish myself and determine what I want to do. It's been a great outlet to discuss topics that I'm passionate about. Last year, I did a topic about being a dad-less daughter and that had a big impact – lots of people wrote me letters and emails. I've started a self-series that talks about self-love and different topics every week and that's really helped me grow as a person, but it also helps others which I think is the best thing you can do in life.

Less than four weeks after Spurs recorded their highest league finish since the 1980s, football fans across the nation are already starting to look forward to the European Championships in France later this month. Here in Haringey, we've been doing our own limbering up for a summer of sporty, outdoor fun.

In the spring, the first sign banning ball games in public places was taken down at Stellar House estate in Northumberland Park. It's part of a borough-wide drive to encourage children to live more active lifestyles.

Ex-Spurs and England ace Ledley King who joined children from Brook House primary school for a first kickabout at Stellar House said: "I remember seeing lots of these signs when I was growing up so I'm pleased to see that Haringey Council has started the process of removing some of the 'No Ball Games' signs."

The removal of 'No Ball Game' signs is one of a number of projects to encourage more outdoor exercise in Haringey. At Finsbury Park, the new-look basketball, volleyball, netball and badminton courts will host their first summer games after a £200,000 refurbishment last year thanks to income raised from major events held in the park.

For those seeking sporting inspiration, the Davis Cup Trophy – won by Great Britain's tennis players for the first time since 1936 last year – will be making an appearance at Haringey's own Albert Road recreation ground on July 10th, the same day as men's final at Wimbledon! Come along if you'd like the chance to pretend you're Andy Murray, get your picture taken with the trophy and enjoy the BBQ, live music and tennis activities for children and adults.

Revolutionary 'arts hotel' opens doors

An innovative new Wood Green hotel that will give actors and artists putting on productions in London a cut-price room and space to collaborate flung open its doors last month.

The Green Rooms, which offers accommodation from just £18 per night, is based in a stunning art-deco Haringey building that has been refurbished to house 20 rooms, restaurant and bar.

The not-for-profit project will work with leading arts organisations like Somerset House, Create London and the Royal Court Theatre to run exhibitions, events and performances at the building on Station Road.

Co-founder Nick Hartwright said: "There are thousands of hotels in London but

there's a real shortage of affordable hotel accommodation that doesn't compromise on quality. We're very confident that artists, creatives, style enthusiasts and the wider local community will love staying and working at Green Rooms."

Haringey Council services go online with My Account

Residents no longer need to call Haringey Council to access many services. 'My Account' allows people who live here to access council services online whenever it suits them. You can set up a personalised account and then log in using a PC or any mobile device with an internet connection.

My Account was launched in February 2016 with council tax and housing benefits services being the first services available. Residents can manage their council tax bills, check housing benefit payments or

apply for housing benefit and council tax reduction. Later in the year new services will be added to My Account to enable residents to report waste, get litter cleaned up and access library services online.

To use My Account, Haringey residents only need to register their details online – it only takes two minutes.

Haringey cuts business rates discounts to new firms

Haringey has become the first council in London to offer discounts to businesses who move into new and converted workspace. The 30 per cent business rate cut took effect in April 2016 and is expected to cut costs for hundreds of firms.

A small business employing 6-7 people is likely to save around £1653.12 a year and a large business employing 60-70 people would save around £16,530 a year.

The business rate cut is aimed at attracting new firms to take advantage of the affordable workspace, highly skilled workforce and great transport links in Haringey.

Kicking off our new 'Haringey's Business' series where we celebrate Haringey's exciting range of independent businesses, we take a look at one of Crouch End's newest arrivals, Edith's House.

"We feel like we've always belonged here!" That's the verdict of Michael Camp, co-owner of Edith's House, a recent arrival in Crouch End's bustling Broadway.

Michael and Eaton James opened Edith's six months ago, following success of the original version in Rye, East Sussex, and a longing to return to London where they have both lived most of their lives.

"Crouch End has a bit of a village feel but also the all day buzz that comes with being in London," says Michael. "It's quite different to Rye, where things are often busy up until 5pm but after that it tends to get pretty quiet."

As Michael talks, we sit in the corner of the cafe, which was formerly a Turkish restaurant until Michael and Eaton decided to try out their novel idea of a cafe in the style of grandma's house.

It does, indeed, feel like we are sitting in the cosy home of a beloved relative. The walls are adorned with decorated plates and family albums – real pictures of both Michael and Eaton's parents and

grandparents. There is a comfy yet dated armchair in the living room, shelves stuffed with board games and knick-knacks and – in an interesting twist – a bathroom, complete with toilet, sink and frilly toilet seat, where you can sit and enjoy a coffee and a cake.

The cafe is busy with Friday afternoon trade – parents with a young child, friends meeting for a bite to eat. Amongst them runs Roux the dog, beloved pet and cafe resident.

In 2012, Eaton was struck by a novel idea – "wouldn't it be great if there was a cafe that was a bit like going round your nans?" – and Edith's House was born. Named after Eaton's grandma, and shaped around fond family memories of enjoying tea and cake at her home, the cafe enjoyed success in Rye before the pair decided to expand to London.

They briefly toyed with the idea of opening somewhere like Dalston – where novel eateries are anything but a novelty these days – before settling on Crouch End, drawn in by the creative spirit of the community and the appetite and willingness to try

something traditional and yet different. "There's lots of artists and creative types here," Michael explains. "We've had lots of interest so far. We've been used as a filming location on a few occasions and word has been spreading quite fast locally. We don't want to be the type of place that people visit just once for the novelty factor, so we're committed to serving the best coffee and food, as well as giving people a great experience."

And what does Edith think of all this entrepreneurial success in her name? Like any good grandma, she's flattered and bursting with pride, of course.

Haringey's Road to Rio

Boxer Nicola Adams became a household name when she won gold at London 2012. Four years later, as she prepares for Rio, we caught up with the Tottenham-based club where she used to train to see what it was like working with the country's most famous female boxer.

Nicola Adams moved to London to train with Haringey Police and Community Boxing Club after hearing about the club's success training women boxers.

"It was great to be chosen by someone like Nicola," said Gerry Wilmott, club founder. "She was great to train with, one of our best boxers and a great personality. It was fantastic to see her achieve such success at the Games."

"It's also been great for our younger members to have a famous name associated with the club – it helps to get them inspired and excited about boxing and keep at it."

Sticking power is key when it comes to this particular sport. Many up-and-coming

members have to fit rigid training schedules in with school and college as well as other life demands. They often have to follow a strict diet and self-discipline is vital.

So why do so many take it up? "It's great for building self-confidence," says Gerry. "We get kids who have been bullied, been in trouble, or simply want to lose weight. Once they get into it, they find they actually enjoy it, and it gives them lots of confidence. Being able to see what boxers like Nicola have achieved spurs them on also."

The club did see an influx of members when Olympic fever gripped the nation four years ago. It's hoping more youngsters will sign up as the world prepares itself for another sporting extravaganza.

The Flints got grants, help and support to move into their snazzy new home

Happy new home: one year in

May 21, 2016 is a special day for Tony and Lynn Flint. It marks one year since the couple moved into their snazzy new home in Ambrose Court, north Tottenham.

The new development, which replaced the derelict Cannon Rubber Factory last year off Tottenham High Road, is now home to dozens of residents who have moved from the neighbouring Love Lane Estate, which is due to be re-developed as part of the council's plans to build thousands of new homes in the area.

Tony and Lynn spent more than 30 years in their previous flat so the move meant an unsurprising mix of emotions.

"I have to admit, it was hard at first," said Lynn. "My daughter grew up in Charles House and it was sad when I locked the door for the final time. But the moment I walked into this new flat, I loved it. It had the feeling of home straight away."

"I like everything about this flat," added Tony. "It's very spacious, the whole block is very clean, the security is good and everyone is so friendly! People are always chatting to you in the halls or outside and perhaps the reason people are friendly is because they are so happy here."

Under Haringey's High Road West scheme, every affected secure council tenant is guaranteed a home in the new development at the same rent level.

More than 50 families in Tottenham have already upped sticks to better or more suitable properties.

"We are so much happier here," said Lynn. "And I feel more relaxed. When we were in Charles House, we did have some stress. There was one person who did make our life hell and a number of times the police had to be called. It did get you down but now we don't get anything like that at all. It's very peaceful and it's so nice to be the first occupants in a place like this."

Birkbeck, University of London and Haringey Council are partnering to inspire Tottenham residents into university to enable them to reach their career goals.

Based in the 639 High Road Enterprise Centre in Tottenham, the programme includes a series of workshops designed to inspire, engage and challenge participants to give them an idea of what studying for a degree-level qualification might be like.

Over the summer, beginning in June, Birkbeck will be running a series of regular events at the 639 Centre as taster sessions for anyone interested in what university has offer.

- **On Tuesday mornings, between 9.30 and 11.30am, the Tottenham Perks coffee** morning will enable local residents to set the agenda on what workshops, lectures and taster sessions they would like to see to explore what university is like and how to get there from where they are now. Free refreshments will be available from the Blooming Scent Café.
- **On Wednesdays, the learner's lounge will run between 4-6.30pm** with different themes each week around building skills and to improve lifestyle, with the opportunity to benefit from a drop-in service to chat with staff from Birkbeck which can answer questions about how to go about further study.
- **Future Focus, on the 4th Wednesday of the month,** will offer one-to-one careers advice and support residents in developing a career plan to enable them to meet their goals.

Vicky Clark, Head of Economic Development and Growth at Haringey Council, said Birkbeck's presence in the borough will have a major impact on the Council's plans to regenerate the area. "We want to achieve physical regeneration for Tottenham – but just as important is transforming what people living in the area feel they can achieve," she said.

"Birkbeck's presence in Tottenham is absolutely vital to contributing to this goal of raising aspirations. Having a research-intensive institution like Birkbeck making a definite and comprehensive commitment to the area is also a powerful statement of confidence which will have knock-on effects, we hope, in attracting businesses and investor support into Haringey, too."

As part of the initiative, Birkbeck is offering residents who participate the opportunity to progress onto its Higher Education Introductory Studies (HEIS) course, a fast-track programme designed to facilitate entry to university. Students who undertake this course will also be offered £2000 bursaries towards their study – substantially reducing the cost of their first year of a degree. Further grants of £800 are available for students who earn less than £25,000.

The HEIS course provides an opportunity to explore a specific subject, such as business, prior to choosing what to study. This is designed to be a gradual introduction to university-level study, helping prospective students to develop the knowledge, skills and understanding that they will need to perform well in higher education.

"A child born in Tottenham today should have opportunities equal to the best in London, and that university of Birkbeck's calibre wants to open here is a vote of confidence in our borough's reputation for rewarding aspiration," said Councillor Joe Goldberg, Cabinet Member for Economic Development, Social Inclusion and Sustainability at Haringey Council.



On arrival, I was greeted by Vanessa, the owner and co-founder at the newly refurbished studios who pleasantly reassured me that I'd be fine. The dance studios were lovely and complete with wall to ceiling dance mirrors, which gave me an

My Recipe

Would you like to share your favourite recipe with 90,000 households in Haringey? Haringey People will be featuring a recipe suggested by a reader and resident in each edition.

The first 'My Recipe' has come from Francesca Johnson, the race director for the annual Hornsey YMCA 10k Run and children's fun run. The Hornsey resident has worked as the YMCA'S Health and Fitness Co-ordinator since 2009 and is a keen runner.

What's your favourite recipe Francesca and why?

Plum Tart is my favourite. I love puddings and simple recipes like this. All this needs are flour, eggs, plums and a bit of sugar. It never goes wrong!



Where did you get the recipe from and when did you first try cooking it?

It's a great Nigel Slater recipe I found in a magazine. I first made it for my husband a few years ago.

What makes the annual Hornsey YMCA 10k run so special?

YMCA North London supports young homeless people. We organise a wide range of activities for young people. The annual 10k race and children's fun runs in May are a great mix of exercise and enjoyment. We put on an event in Priority Park, Crouch End which has great support from the community with hundreds of people

volunteering. Thousands of people come down to take part. Since we launched the 10k and children's fun runs a few years ago they've raised over £270,000!

Are you a keen runner?

Yes, I've run for years including a half marathon and I've also trained people. I'm running the Finsbury Park Pretty Muddy 5k race in July.



Francesca Johnson

Francesca's Plum Pie recipe

Pastry:

100g, butter
100g, golden caster sugar
an egg, lightly beaten
175g, plain flour
½ tsp baking powder
a little milk for brushing

Filling:

800g-1kg ripe plums or greengages
2-3 tbs golden caster sugar
ground cinnamon, a knifepoint

Cooking:

Cream the butter and caster sugar in a food mixer till light and fluffy.

Mix in the lightly beaten egg, then gently add the flour and baking powder. Remove dough from the mixing bowl and roll into a ball on a heavily floured work surface. Knead the dough for a minute or two until smooth

and soft. Wrap in greaseproof or waxed paper and refrigerate for about 20 minutes.

Set the oven at 180C/gas mark 4. Cut the ripe plums or greengages in half and remove their stones.

Cut the fruit into large pieces, toss with the caster sugar and cinnamon and put into a lightly buttered 20-22cm baking dish.

Roll out the pastry on a floured board, then lift carefully on to the pie. There will be a little left over. The crust is very short and it really doesn't matter if it tears as you lower it over the fruit. Some of the juice will probably erupt through it as it cooks anyway. At least I hope so.

Brush the pastry lightly with milk and bake for 40 minutes. The pastry should be pale-biscuit coloured. Dust with caster sugar and serve warm with cream.

Serve the pie upside down with the pastry on the bottom!

Cracking down on Blue Badge fraud

The Blue Badge scheme enables over two million people with severe walking disabilities to park in restricted areas around the UK and when travelling throughout any other EU country.

If you have a Blue Badge, you can park for up to 3 hours on a single or double yellow line and in some boroughs, including Haringey, you can park for free and for any length of time in resident permit bays and pay and display areas.

For thousands of disabled people in Haringey, the Blue Badge is a lifeline. Without it, many people would find it difficult to go to the shops, visit the doctor or see friends and family.

But many disabled Haringey residents are often stopped from using parking spaces intended for them because of Blue Badge fraudsters who use fake or cancelled badges or a badge belonging to someone else.

Haringey Council is working with the Metropolitan Police to tackle Blue Badge fraud in our borough through Operation Bodmin. In Green Lanes officers confiscated three Blue Badges and two vehicles were towed away. In Tottenham cancelled badges were confiscated and fraudsters' cars towed away.

To tackle the theft of Blue Badges from disabled drivers' vehicles when parked outside their homes in our borough, we have introduced the Companion Badge. The badge incorporates the vehicle registration number so that it can't be used on any other vehicle, and would be of no value to anyone other than the legitimate holder of a Blue Badge.

The cost of Blue Badge fraud is huge. Taking 100 fraudulent Blue Badges off the streets over a year could save councils more than £500,000, according to a recent estimate. So, Operation Bodmin could save Haringey money as well as creating more space for disabled people to park in.

As well as the usual book loaning service, you can now download e-books and audiobooks and use WiFi at all Haringey libraries. There is also an app available which allows you to access the full library catalogue and provide directions to the library using GPS technology.

Activities and events take place at the libraries throughout the year, including arts and crafts, workshops, author and speaker events. Adults can brush up on their English, maths or PC skills through the Haringey Adult Learning Service (HALS) programme; many of the courses

are free of charge and offered throughout the week.

During October, the libraries are busy with activities as we celebrate Black History Month which gives residents an opportunity to acknowledge the achievements of its Black community.

We have responded to the government's funding cuts by changing the way we think about the purpose of libraries, providing more council services while delivering high standards and value for money.

A great example of this new approach is the Marcus Garvey library which is opening soon, after months of refurbishment, with a new customer service area so residents can access their council services in one place.

Library buildings also need to be fit for purpose and serve all members of the community. The public consultation for Muswell Hill library is underway and you have the opportunity to send us your views on the proposed changes for the library which currently has poor access for wheelchair users and parents with pushchairs.


