## 'Stravel' App rewards smarter travel

A ground-breaking new website and mobile app is offering Haringey residents the opportunity to collect reward points every time they walk or cycle.

Stravel gives people the chance to log each journey they make on foot or by bike – with every mile worth one point that can be put towards discounts and special offers at shops and leisure centres.

For example, walking 50 miles and recording it online or on the Stravel smartphone app could earn a free pass to one of Haringey's gyms. Similar to airmiles, the more people travel, the more Stravel points they will earn and the better the offers will be.

Companies including Evans Cycles, Waitrose and Zavvi, alongside local retailers including Finsbury Cycles and Fusion – who run Haringey leisure centres – are taking part.

Stravel will also allow people to calculate how many calories they have burned, and how much money they have saved by steering clear of using their cars.

## Thousands enjoy Crouch End Festival

Thousands of residents from Crouch End and beyond enjoyed a packed programme of performance, markets and activities at the second Crouch End Festival in June.

## Holocaust Memorial Garden unveiled

A striking sculpture to honour the six million Jews murdered at the hands of the Nazis forms the centrepiece of a poignant Holocaust Memorial Garden unveiled at Bruce Castle Park, Tottenham.

The garden was officially opened by Susie Halter, the widow of late Holocaust survivor Roman Halter, on what would have been her husband's 86th birthday this summer.

A team of six former young offenders designed the sculpture, as well as working to clear and create the memorial garden, in a unique project led by Haringey Council's equalities and youth offending services.

Mrs Halter was joined by daughter Aviva Halter-Hurn and the Mayor

of Haringey, Cllr Sheila Peacock, for a special ceremony to open the garden.

Cllr Peacock said: "I am delighted that Susie was able to open this beautiful garden, where we can remember the victims of the horrors of the Holocaust.

"Roman dedicated his life to telling his story so the lessons of the past would live on, and he would have been proud of the work our young people did to create this sculpture."

The group of former young offenders will also continue to maintain the garden, which was funded by charity donations.

### Noise advice

Haringey residents are urged to consider their neighbours and keep noise down as warm weather continues.

The council's noise enforcement team sees an increase in complaints during the summer, when windows are left open and more people use their gardens.

When necessary, the council will pursue persistent noise nuisance offenders through the courts.

### Spot the cyclist

More than 100 Haringey Council drivers have completed a new safety course designed to make them more aware of vulnerable road users.

The Safe Urban Driving Course has been offered to all council drivers, including those who may have to drive large vehicles or lorries.

The short course is approved by Transport for London and includes a theory module and practical training to demonstrate how cyclists and others use the road.

### Big switch to return

Haringey's second big switch is all set for October – and will give residents another chance to make huge savings on their energy bills.

The Big Switch helps households team up to get the best deal from gas and electricity providers. The more people sign up, the bigger the savings are likely to be.

April's big switch saw more than 650 local households register, with average annual savings of £65.

### Rat run

A Tottenham restaurant was so infested with rats and mice that when council officers and police paid a surprise visit, the staff fled.

Gazali, Bruce Grove, was subject to an emergency closure when council environmental health officers found the premises to be a health risk.

A spot inspection found a rodent infestation, dirty surfaces and high-risk foods stored in a faulty chiller. Staff were also unaware of safe food handling procedures.

When officers explained that they would have to close the restaurant, the staff left. The building's owner, who was already taking the shop back from the tenants, has cleared and cleaned the building.



## Tottenham Active!

A three-year scheme to get more people into sport has kicked off in Tottenham.

Tottenham Active! sees a range of free and low-cost beginner classes in a range of sports, from tag rugby and boxing to netball and Tai-Chi.

It aims to tackle the borough's health inequalities and build a lasting legacy to London 2012 through grassroots sport.

People living in Tottenham tend to do less exercise than in other parts of the borough, and are more at risk of cardiovascular diseases and cancer than those in the west of Haringey.

Some of those who take part in Tottenham Active! will be offered training to become mentors, while there will be an extra push to get people involved in sports in their community.

Events will take place in parks, leisure centres and other community venues.

### Landlord fined

An accredited landlord with a large property portfolio has become the first to be fined under a special licensing scheme that regulates houses in multiple occupation (HMOs) in the Harringay Ladder area.

Andreas Ioannou of Manor Property Group in Green Lanes was fined £3,000 for failing to apply for the necessary HMO licence for a shared house in Seymour Road, N8.

Alibra Ltd, owned by other Ioannou family members, was fined £1,000 for the same offence. The council was awarded full costs of £1,725.

Mr Ioannou has now submitted licence applications for nine properties and provided a list of other properties for which applications will also be submitted.

### Payday loans block

Haringey Council has blocked the top 50 payday loan firms from its IT network to help protect residents from the pitfalls of excessive interest rates.

The companies' websites – some of which charge annual interest rates of more than 4,000 per cent – will no longer be accessible from council computers in the borough's libraries and other buildings.

The move will help residents avoid falling into spirals of ever-increasing debt. The council will continue to promote the Haringey, Islington and City Credit Union, which offers affordable loans and encourages saving.

# Introducing Haringey's outstanding carers 2013

Picking winners from the many amazing and inspirational nominations for the awards was a tough decision, but each one stood out for their special dedication – and for their ability to smile and carry on through some very tough demands.

Young Carer of the Year, Fatna Khalid (pictured top left), 12, lives in Wood Green and helps care for older sister Zeineb, who has special needs. She said she was “so excited” to win the award.

Mum Meriem, described her daughter as “no ordinary girl”, and said she has been helping care for her sister since she was just three-years-old, alerting Meriem to any difficulties.

She said: “Fatna has always been ready to drop what she is doing to run to the help of Zeineb.”

“Both myself and Zeineb have been very ill this year and Fatna has missed out on school and on fun to look after us. She does everything she can without ever complaining or forgetting to smile.”

Adult Carer of the Year Jay Ray Stephenson (pictured bottom left) was honoured for the tireless and dignified way he cares for his mother, who has dementia. Jay Ray is one of many adult carers to have given up work to dedicate themselves to full-time caring.

He said he is proud to care for his mum, adding: “It is great to be given this honour, but it’s what I feel I should do – my mum cared for me and now it’s my turn to make sure she is as comfortable as possible in her old age.”

Modest 17-year-old George Onofrei (pictured bottom right) earned the Outstanding Achievement award for the great lengths he goes to to support his family.

Last year, George’s mother Gabriela Cullen was diagnosed with terminal cancer while pregnant with her third child. Her little boy was delivered early so that she could have emergency surgery and begin chemotherapy, and George took on huge responsibilities to support his mum, step-dad and two younger brothers.

He takes his three-year-old brother on the bus each morning, dropping him at nursery on his way to college, and has learned to bottle feed and change nappies to help with the baby.

George said caring was “just his job” and said he was proud that his mum, who is still receiving treatment, nominated him. Gabriela was by his side as he collected his award at an emotional ceremony.

She said: “He plays with both of his brothers and makes them laugh, even when he feels sad. His brothers love him so much. He is quietly kind and cares deeply for us.”

All nominated carers were given a certificate from the Mayor and enjoyed a buffet after the presentations.

# Time for twenty?

“Haringey Council has unveiled proposals to make the entire borough a 20mph zone for motorists – and is calling on local residents to back them.”

The plans – which follow appeals from local residents and road safety campaigners – would see speeds capped at 20mph on all council-maintained roads in the borough.

Reducing speed limits would help make the borough’s roads safer for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers.

The change would be backed by Smarter Travel support for alternatives to driving, such as promoting and rewarding walking and cycling.

Findings from the independent Transport Research Laboratory indicate that a 20mph limit could help reduce road accident injuries in the borough.

Figures from the Royal Society for Prevention of Accidents show that a pedestrian hit by a vehicle travelling at 20mph has a less

than three per cent chance of being killed. If the vehicle is travelling at 30mph, the risk of death increases to 20 per cent.

The council previously considered introducing a 20mph limit, but was held back by prohibitively high costs. A recent relaxation of legislation by the Department for Transport means a limit can now be introduced relatively inexpensively through clear signage and road markings.

If the change does go ahead, the support of residents and motorists will be needed to make it work, by making it the norm to stick to 20mph when driving around and through the borough.

Residents are invited to have their say, and all opinions will be taken on board.

## Haringey's emerging markets

Take a walk around Haringey this weekend and you're likely to stumble across a new trend – street markets offering an independent alternative to high street brands are popping up across the borough.

Thriving markets offer diverse food, locally-made clothes and family entertainment and are bringing communities together.

New markets have joined more established events like Alexandra Palace Farmers' Market and permanent street traders in Tottenham and Wood Green to bring more choice to shoppers in Haringey.

In September, Myddleton Road Market will hold its second trial event in Bowes Park. Last month a new community market for Noel Park was launched, while in June Haringay Market celebrated its first anniversary at South Haringay Primary School.

Haringay organiser and self-confessed 'foodie' Jessica Vos said she brought together local traders to start the weekly market after she saw successful street stalls elsewhere in London.

She said: "It's a place for people to meet up with each other and have a chat, while buying delicious food. We support local businesses and farmers, and offer an alternative to supermarkets.

"Most of the time you get to meet the butcher or the actual farmer who can tell you about how they reared the animals – you can speak to the experts and I think that's special."

Hundreds of people enjoyed the market's first birthday party and Jessica hopes more people will choose to shop locally and

support independent trade.

For Lucy Whitehead, who launched Myddleton Road Market in June, it's about exhibiting the diverse range of products available to people on their doorstep.

She said: "Creating a trial of the Myddleton Road Market has been very exciting to do because Bowes Park really needs a market and people to return to the road."

# Kids stay healthy with HENRY



Children and parents are being helped into healthier lifestyles in the battle against childhood obesity.

The HENRY programme – Health, Exercise and Nutrition for the Really Young – is a free eight-week course that offers parents and carers of children under-5 a kick-start in active play and improving their approach to meal times.

Juggling work, life and kids is a tough job. HENRY helps find the simple changes that can make a big difference to giving children a healthy start.

At St Ann's Triangle Children's Centre (pictured), parents and children tucked into a healthy snack while playing before children enjoyed a free crèche while mums, dads and carers got to grips with topics such as healthy eating, how to reward children for good behaviour and how to enhance learning through play.

Cristal Ramsey told the organisers that the course had been a huge help. She said: "The course helped me to be better, and made me stronger with more understanding as a parent. It has also helped me to have more confidence in myself."

Kirsty Whitley said she would recommend the HENRY course to others. She added: "If you stick with the whole course you can see the end result.

"It's great to have other people outside friends and family who can support you and share ideas. Everyone is different with different situations, and it helps you to see other ways of dealing with things."

HENRY courses are run in Haringey children's centres by trained facilitators and have a free crèche. Most parents come with pre-school aged children but HENRY is designed for those with babies and expectant parents too.

Another local mum added "I wasn't sure what to expect, but it's been great. I've got lots of ideas now. I feel like I can give my kids better food, be more involved in them playing and I get how important it is to praise them when they choose the healthy option."

The new academic year will see the start of a new challenge, when Haringey's first ever Schools Champion, Christine Gilbert (CBE), comes on board to help drive improvements in education.

Former Head of Ofsted and Director of Education, Ms Gilbert said: "I am looking forward to being at the heart of developing a new and improved Outstanding for All culture that the entire borough can be proud of."

Progress has already been made, with many of our primary, secondary and special schools achieving 'good' or 'outstanding' Ofsted ratings.

The independently commissioned education report – Outstanding for All – showed how even more could be done to accelerate improvement.

## Making Haringey's schools outstanding for all will mean:

- All Haringey schools judged by Ofsted as 'good' or better by 2016
- All Haringey schools to exceed London attainment at Key Stage 2 and GCSEs by 2016
- Reducing the gap between the lowest achieving children at Early Years Foundation Stage and others
- Raising attainment, in particular among children living in the most deprived parts of Haringey
- Increasing access to employment, education and training for young people

The Schools Champion is part of an action plan that will see the council working with schools, governors, pupils and parents to deliver the Outstanding for All ambitions.

## Other highlights include:

- Consulting headteachers and governors on a schools improvement strategy
- Ensuring schools set targets to meet ambitions for Key Stage 2 and GCSEs
- A £250,000 Education Innovation Fund to help schools pilot new ways of delivering outstanding results
- Ensuring all schools have high-calibre governors who are well trained and supported
- Improving support services
- Introducing a pilot Pupil Passport scheme to support children when they move between schools
- Providing families with an annual scorecard and advice on supporting a child's learning
- Regular public meetings to explain educational developments
- A 'Best of Haringey' event to celebrate school achievements
- Supporting young people at risk of dropping out or not in education, employment or training
- Building bridges between Haringey schools and leading universities

## Tottenham's brighter future



Haringey People looks forward to further improvements in Tottenham.

### Transforming Tottenham

Each of the five buildings most badly destroyed in the riots has been, or is close to being, fully restored.

- A new Aldi supermarket is open.
- Restoration of Carpetright and River Heights flats is almost complete.
- Planning permission has been granted to transform the former Post Office site with a four-storey building and homes above High Road shops.
- 639 High Road has reopened as a hub for local entrepreneurs.
- Work to rebuild offices at 662 High Road due to start this summer.

Work is underway on the Spurs development, starting with the a Sainsbury's supermarket that will bring 250 jobs. The 56,000 capacity Premier League stadium and hundreds of new homes will follow.

Abandoned land at Lawrence Road is being brought back into use, while improvements in Bruce Grove will include restoring the railway bridge, redesigning local markets and cleaning up the station.

### Your community

Community activities have included local markets and festivals, while the 2013 Summer of Fun programme is now in full swing.

The three-year Tottenham Active! project has been launched, bringing free and low-cost beginner sports classes. Tottenham Green Leisure Centre is undergoing a £7million improvement programme.

Lordship Rec has enjoyed a £5million community-led revamp, and Bruce Castle Park tennis courts have been resurfaced.

The council is committed to making Tottenham Green the civic heart of Tottenham, with cultural, arts and community facilities.

The High Road West plans include a new public square outside an improved White Hart Lane station.

### Education

A new primary school will open in 2015 at the derelict Cannon Rubber Factory site.

A University Technical College at the Spurs development will focus on science, sport and health for teenagers aged 14 and up, while Haringey Council is in talks to bring higher education to Tottenham, using empty land at Marsh Lane.

### Transport

Two-way traffic has been restored to Tottenham High Road as work to dismantle the unpopular one-way loop continues.

A £20million new bus, rail and underground station is coming to Tottenham Hale, complete with a public square and better facilities for cyclists. There are also plans for a £72million upgrade of local rail links to bring four trains per hour to Tottenham Hale.

### Local business

Support from the Heritage Lottery Fund will help towards restoring traditional High Road shop fronts to the former glory.

There will be a new town centre for Tottenham Hale, centred around a re-vamped retail park with homes, jobs and community facilities.

The Tottenham High Street Charter has united local traders, police and the council to make our high streets more welcoming, and the council is investing £500,000 in working with traders to improve West Green Road.



Sasha also works as a netball development community coach in Haringey and is determined to get more people of all ages and abilities playing the sport she loves.

The Back 2 Netball scheme, supported by England Netball and Haringey Council, sees seven beginner sessions a week across the borough, with some teams playing in local and regional leagues.

Sasha said: "Back 2 Netball is a really great way to get active and have fun – everyone has played the sport at some point in their life and when people come back they like it even more because it's not like school and is more social.

"We want everyone to have a go at netball. We're Tottenham girls and we just want to give back to the area that we came from and still live in."

# MAKING FREEDOM Exhibition

Come along to the Marcus Garvey Library, see and be inspired by an exhibition that shows how Africans fought British plantocracy in the Caribbean to end forced servitude, and hasten full emancipation. The new exhibition, presented by Windrush Foundation and supported by Heritage Lottery Fund, marks the 175th anniversary of Emancipation Day in the Caribbean. It was on August the 1st 1838 that nearly a million Africans in British colonies won their liberty, having been enslaved for all or most of their lives. Also, on that day the African family unit was re-born; it had been undermined by plantation owners over the previous 200 years.

Riots, rebellions and revolution were significant factors in hastening the passing of the 1833 Emancipation Act. Abolitionists validated the rebels as agents advancing the anti-slavery campaign and showing that the penalties Africans suffered after failed rebellions revealed the brutality of colonial society. The enslaved were prepared to be martyrs for the cause of freedom.

According to Richard Hart in his book, *From Occupation to Independence* (1988), Reverend Henry Bleby gave an assessment of the significance of the December 1831 / January 1832 revolt that had occurred in Jamaica: ***'The revolt failed of accomplishing the immediate purpose of the author, yet by it a further wound was dealt to slavery, which accelerated its destruction; for it demonstrated to the imperial legislature that among Negroes themselves the spirit of freedom had been widely diffused, as to render it most perilous to postpone the settlement of the most important question of emancipation to a later period.'***

*'The evidence taken before the Committee of the two Houses of Parliament made it manifest, that if the abolition of slavery were not speedily affected by the peaceable method of legislative enactment, the slaves would assuredly take the matter into their own hands, and bring their bondage to a violence and bloody termination.'* (Page 39)

## Exploring changes to health care

Haringey GP and Chair of Haringey's Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) Dr Helen Pelendrides sets out some of the differences in local care.

"The recent changes to healthcare and the NHS aren't easy to understand – even for those of us who are right in the thick of it!" admits Dr Pelendrides.

"The key change is that Primary Care Trusts no longer exist, and a number of new organisations now cover the work they did."

The council runs public health services such as quit smoking, prevention and encouraging healthy lifestyles, while the CCG is responsible for planning, buying and monitoring health services for local people.

Dr Pelendrides explains: "We commission lots of different types of healthcare services from hospitals and community-based providers, like blood testing, podiatry, and physiotherapy, as well as planning mental health provision across the borough."

"The CCG is run by GPs and other health professionals to try to ensure that services are really tapped into what local people want and need from their NHS at the grass roots."

The CCG works closely with the council to provide some services that are part of both health and social care, such as nursing homes.

# Threads of History through Haringey...

Sewing is said to be therapeutic as well as creative, but here in Haringey it's also historic – as a project to showcase beautiful and unique embroideries and samplers is set to illustrate.

The rare pieces dating from the 18th and 19th centuries are so fragile that they are usually kept out of sight. But a recent restoration by specialist textile conservators, with the help of the Friends of Bruce Castle and the Radcliffe Trust, means they can now be put on public display.

The detailed artefacts show the craftwork of local girls or women – possibly from Tottenham's Quaker community. The oldest work on show dates back more than 200 years to 1781.

The local area is highlighted in textile maps included in the collection. One (shown above) uses silks to depict scenes of Tottenham's parish church and graveyard (All Hallows Church), while the other shows a plan and survey of the estate of a John Brown.

The country lanes and fields offer a fascinating insight into land use and ownership over the ages in Haringey, including Hanger Lane (today's St Ann's Road and West Green Road) highlighted in stitch.

Also included is a map of the British Isles with place names stitched into the fabric, which was sewn by Mary Wetson, who worked in Tottenham in 1784.

The collection shows the range of traditional skills that existed in our communities, and the contribution made by local women.

Bruce Castle Museum curator Deborah

Hedgecock says that these kinds of crafts produced by women are often overlooked and were not always well looked after.

She said: "Embroidery, and especially embroidered maps, are a rare survival. Hopefully by seeing such work on display in a public space, we can promote understanding of these kinds of crafts across generations and across different cultures, as well as giving value and importance to similar skills that exist today.

"I know that my mother's generation did sewing for practical reasons and for pleasure. I hope that women in Haringey who have similar traditions will come and visit."


