This will be my last column as a councillor and Leader of Haringey Council, as I will not be seeking re-elections at the local council elections in May.

It has been the most enormous privilege to represent you as a Seven Sisters ward councillor and the Leader of Haringey during a decade that has seen a great deal of change in the borough.

When I became Leader in 2008, Haringey was at one of the lowest points in its history and there's no doubt that the council had some serious improvements to make. It has been an honour to work alongside fellow councillors, council staff, partner organisations, community groups and local residents to improve the council and to make Haringey a better borough to live, work in and visit.

I came into politics because I believed it to be the best way of improving lives, and I remain clear that local councils are at the forefront of shaping the physical, social and economic future of communities – creating better places and stronger communities supported by public services that respond to people's needs. I believe that local government should always be focused on using all the tools available to it to improve the lives of the people it represents.

I'm proud that today Haringey is a far more and ambitious borough than it was when I was first elected. A borough where we have worked shoulder-to-shoulder with our teachers and schools staff so that today almost all schools are rated "good" or "outstanding" by Ofsted. A borough where exam results are amongst the fastest improving in the country, and where young people have access to amazing opportunities thanks to exceptional education and the opening of institutions such as the London Academy of Excellence and national digital skills college ADA.

I'm proud also that Haringey is a place that is open for business, and where local people have opportunities to train and work in tech and creative industries that will shape our future economy. We've managed to attract £500m public sector and £3billion private sector investment so that we can build new homes, help people into jobs and regenerate landmarks including Alexandra Palace and Hornsey Town Hall. And we've also protected our libraries and improved outdoor spaces so that Haringey now boasts 23 Green Flag award-winning parks.

Improving Haringey has been a team effort, and I am grateful to everyone who has played a part in helping to make this borough the best in London. Thank you.

Lighting up Tottenham Green



More than 200 solar-powered lanterns, created with the help of local primary school pupils, lit up Tottenham Green throughout January.

The special jars, designed to glow at night using solar energy, were decorated by children from Ferry Lane Primary, Willow Primary School, Holy Trinity CE Primary School and Harris Primary Academy Coleraine Park.

Nicholas Miller, Headteacher at Ferry Lane Primary school, said: "This is a great community art project and the children had so much fun decorating their lanterns. It was brilliant

to see them all in place lighting up Tottenham Green throughout the darkest time of the year."

The colourful lanterns were suspended between trees on wire ropes to create a large central multi-layered chandelier. Art installation specialists Creatmosphere led the project, which helped brighten the green every night last month.



Hornsey Library's new look

Haringey bookworms will enjoy a bright new library space and modern facilities thanks to more than £1million investment in Crouch End's iconic Hornsey Library.

The Grade II listed building is set for a host of internal improvements including new furniture and IT equipment, an improved children's library and a refurbished main library and main entrance.

The enhancements will go hand-in-hand with essential maintenance works including roof repairs and a new heating system to make the building fit for the future.

Works have been carefully designed to ensure they respect the special architectural character and

history of the much-loved original library – with minimum impact on the structure of the building and no plans to introduce additional services such as customer service counters.

A detailed review to establish the scale of works needed is underway, with improvements set to start later this year and to last around 10-12 months. Information boards setting out the history of Hornsey Library and an outline of the planned works are on display now.

The works are part of Haringey Council's ongoing commitment to maintaining and improving the borough's library service, including keeping all nine libraries open.



Tottenham Hale's community heart

A new community centre – boasting London's first purpose-built Anglican church for 40 years – has opened in Tottenham Hale.

The Engine Room – named after the furniture factory turned World War Two fighter aircraft production hub – is home to a community centre, nursery, café and St Francis Church.

Operations Manager Andrew Johnston said: "Our strapline is 'the community starts here' and we really want to get all sections of the community involved in what we are doing. We are looking for people to bring their ideas and their enthusiasm because a place like this really can make a difference."

Rock the Palace

More than 200 schoolchildren from across Haringey became rock stars for the day as they took part in the Trinity on Tour Rock and Pop event at Alexandra Palace.

Organised by Trinity College, London, the roof-raising event gave pupils and music teachers the chance to meet and play alongside real session musicians on keyboards, guitar, bass and drums.

The Trinity Rock and Pop syllabus features songs by a host of well-known artists including Tottenham's own Adele, legend David Bowie, country-pop queen Taylor Swift and electronic duo Daft Punk.



Stonewall school champions

Woodside High School, Wood Green, has become the first secondary school in London to earn the prestigious Stonewall School Champion Gold Award.

Acting legend Sir Ian McKellen paid a visit to Woodside to celebrate the accolade, which recognises the school's work to tackle homophobic, biphobic and transphobic bullying, and to celebrate diversity.

Woodside co-headteachers Gerry Robinson and Elma McElligott said they were delighted with the award, which recognises "the hard work of our whole school community and our shared commitment to tackling prejudice".

Dominic Arnall, Head of Projects and Programmes at Stonewall, said: "I have visited Woodside personally a number of times and the happy, productive young people are testament to the hard work the faculty have put in, ensuring every student at Woodside High is accepted without exception."



Room without a view

A landlord who rented out an unsafe, unheated flat with no windows has been fined almost £9,000.

Inspectors visiting Ado Adewale's HMO in West Green Road, Tottenham, found there was no shared fire alarm, two of eight flats were without heating and one had no windows apart from a small skylight. They also discovered an unguarded staircase and bare ceiling light dangling next to a shower.

A prohibition order was served, banning Mr Adewale from renting out the windowless flat until he had addressed concerns, but when officers revisited they found he had failed to carry out repairs and had moved a new tenant in.

Mr Adewale was fined £6,600 and ordered to pay £2,925 costs.

Tackling rogue landlords

Tackling criminal landlords and stamping out anti-social behaviour are at the heart of council proposals to license private rented properties.

Residents are being invited to give their views on plans for a Haringey-wide licensing scheme would cover houses in multiple occupation (HMOs) while a separate targeted scheme would apply to privately rented homes in parts of the borough facing the biggest problems.

Landlords would be required to keep properties safe and well-maintained, and deal with any problems associated with their tenants. Landlords who fail to meet standards could face enforcement action. Landlords would pay a fee for each property they rent out, to cover the costs of the scheme.

New homes for North Tottenham

Thousands of new homes will be built opposite the new Spurs stadium after Haringey Council signed an agreement with leading developer Lendlease.

The High Road West development agreement will bring more than 2,500 high quality homes, including at least 750 affordable homes for local people and more than 190 new council homes.

It will also see a new library and learning centre; a refurbished community hub; a new civic square for community and cultural events, flanked by

shops, restaurants and cafes; new green spaces including gardens, an outdoor gym and a children's play area; more than £10million social and economic support for businesses and residents; town centre investment and community events; thousands of construction jobs and hundreds of new jobs following development; a new industrial space to support businesses, and a new district energy centre.



Freedom Pass



All Londoners who have passed state pension age are entitled to claim a Freedom Pass, offering free travel on London public transport.

Some residents may see their Freedom Pass expire at the end of March. If your pass is due to expire, you should receive a letter with a four-digit renewal code. Simply log on to www.freedompass.org/renew and confirm your details to renew.

Policing in Haringey

Changes to policing in the borough have been introduced following last year's public access strategy by the Mayor of London and Met Police.

The 24-hour front counter at Tottenham police station remains open, but may move to a new site in the future. Front counters at Hornsey police station and Fishmongers Arms, Wood Green, have now closed.

Each Haringey ward has two dedicated ward officers and a PCSO, equipped with mobile tablets to enable them to spend more time in the community. They will also hold weekly community contact sessions. For info about your local policing team, visit www.met.police.uk or follow @MPSHaringey on Twitter.



Paw patrol...

Take a look at these paw-fect pooches, as they join local police community support officers on a winter dog walk.

The fun scenes at Priory Park are part of Haringey Police's quirky new Dog Watch scheme, to engage with residents on dog walks at parks across the borough.

The walks are being run by PCSOs Stef Gibbs and Avra Wyke – both huge dog lovers themselves – and they are encouraging people to join them and other residents every month.

PCSO Wyke says: "It was the Borough Commander's idea – Dog Watch. The idea is that dog walkers already feel comfortable in parks and now they can come along and engage with us or, if they want to, give us information on things like graffiti and crime.

"We want to build up relationships with the community and make our parks a nicer place."

PCSO Wyke has been a police community support officer in Haringey for nine years and grew up in Crouch End. She's based in Tottenham Green ward, but the walks are an opportunity to get to know residents in other parts of the borough too.

She says: "It's about people from other areas getting to know us. We're trying to build up constant communication and become familiar faces. The message is 'come and see us'. I want to build a relationship with the community and restore faith in

the police. We hope that Dog Watch stays as a regular thing and that it continues."

The first Dog Watch was at Finsbury Park and Priory Park soon followed. The events will be held once a month, taking in a different Haringey Green Flag park each time.

New Year, new you

With Christmas festivities a distant memory, the New Year can be a great time to make lifestyle changes.

"How are you?" is the question being asked by One You Haringey – the borough's free healthy lifestyle service – to encourage local residents to assess their health and think about how they might make improvements.

One You Haringey's range of services can help you make small but meaningful steps to a happier and healthier lifestyle. The free programme supports people to manage their weight, quit smoking, drink less alcohol, and be more mobile. This winter and spring, the service is particularly focusing on its 'Move More' and 'Be Smoke Free' programmes.

Haringey residents keen to increase their physical exercise can benefit from activity sessions in green spaces and fitness centres across the borough.

Anyone wanting to kick the smoking habit can get access to sessions with an expert adviser who can provide the right support to help people quit for good – including, if required, nicotine replacement therapy.

Daniel Alleyne, Service Manager for One You Haringey, said: "Haringey residents are definitely starting to take control of their health. So far, 479 people have started our 'Be Smoke Free' service, and a massive 86 percent of those people have set quit dates.

"In the last nine months, almost 1,000 people have referred themselves on to our 'Move More' programme, meaning they've benefitted from our free physical activity sessions taking place across the borough.

"Whether you're interested in stopping smoking and being more active, or any of our other healthy lifestyle services, we would love to hear from you."

Born revvy

If you're into motorbikes and live in Haringey, you'll probably already know about Karen Neill. The boss of Tottenham's Zenith Motorcycles has been in the industry for 22 years – and she's a big hit.

Successful, hard-working and kind-hearted, Karen has done a huge amount for the community, and now she's been named Britain's Biking Hero.

Karen, whose family have hailed from Tottenham for 200 years, received the award – launched by Motorcycle News and insurers Carole Nash – on stage at Motorcycle Live at the Birmingham NEC. Contestants had been whittled down to the final three, and Karen's charity work, support for youngsters and road safety campaigning saw her crowned the winner.

"It was nerve-racking", says Karen, who donated her £1,000 prize to charity. "There were superbike champions, motorbike legends, the NEC was full. The other two nominees I felt were as worthy, if not more.

"I was amazed, embarrassed, everything at once. I felt really humbled. The people who voted were from the community. I've lived in Haringey all my life – knowing they voted for me was amazing.

"When someone said I was a 'national hero' – you have to laugh. The award made me feel that as a woman in this industry, I'd finally been taken seriously."

Karen – the only woman in Britain who owns and runs a motorcycle garage – has owned Zenith for four years and has used her work to help countless people, from teaching

children road safety to offering disadvantaged people work experience.

She says: "I want our young people to have ambition. Everybody deserves a chance. We get homeless people in, people out of rehab and I've worked with basically every school in Haringey.

"There's no reason we can't give a little time out of our day. I love this job, and we do it in a way that gets the community involved."

Community is important to Karen, whose grandfather worked for the legendary JA Prestwich Motorcycles. She says of Zenith: "We're here for anybody with a scooter or bike – for security advice, safety advice, support for new riders. Lots of people pop in to say hello. The kettle's always on."





Help us end violence against women and girls

"I was very struck by just what a massive issue this is," says Stuart Cox, explaining what motivated him to become one of Haringey's first ambassadors for the campaign to end violence against women and girls (VAWG).

Stuart is Head of Participation at Jacksons Lane Theatre in Highgate and chairs the Haringey White Ribbon Steering Group – set up to help organisations and authorities work together to tackle VAWG.

He had previously been involved in theatre and self-defence projects about violence against women, which opened his eyes to the issue.

"In one of our projects the women taking part said they wanted men to be more involved in the efforts to end VAWG," explains Stuart. "For me, this was an opportunity to do something positive and look at ways I could help bring men and boys into this work."

Ambassadors are tasked with inspiring and informing people through talks, community events and social media. They also sign the White Ribbon pledge – promising not to commit, condone or remain silent about abuse – and ask others to do the same.

After signing up, Stuart attended what he describes as "very powerful" training and began meeting people in the community to encourage and help them to raise awareness.

"One of the moments I especially enjoyed was working with a group of young people who were doing the National Citizen Service programme and encouraging them to include the White Ribbon message in their social action campaign," he said.

Stuart also works closely with the council's VAWG team, helping organise a launch event at Alexandra Palace and planning how to use social media and recruit other male ambassadors.

White Ribbon is a national campaign aimed at ending violence against women and girls. Last year, Haringey Council received official White Ribbon accreditation for its commitment and ongoing partnership work.

The future's bright for Ada

In the 19th century, Ada Lovelace cut an unconventional figure – a gambler and an adulteress with a reputation for being hot-headed. But she was also a visionary who saw the potential of computers more than a century before one had even been built.

More than 150 years later, Ada gives her name to a small but rapidly growing college in Tottenham that, like its namesake, is leading the way and standing out from the crowd.

Ada College, which recently celebrated its first birthday, works alongside industry to equip young people with top-flight technical, entrepreneurial and creative skills.

"When we opened we had 60 students in our sixth form, now we have 110, plus 63 apprentices currently on placement at companies such as Google and Deloitte," says co-founder and Chief Executive Mark Smith.

"We have had lots of interest from students from a range of backgrounds and we've had a great response and lots of engagement from industry experts. Being based in Tottenham has been the making of our college. This location has been fantastic, we are well connected to London and it's easy for industry contacts to reach us."

Malachi Johnson, pastoral care and project management officer, says it's great to be a part of Haringey's excellent partnership working, adding: "There's a lot of untapped talent in Haringey, we see that in the students who come through our doors."

Around 60 percent of the college's students are local, including Janet Voong who is studying computer science BTEC, psychology and graphics.

"I wanted to come and study here because it's different from other colleges," she says. "It prepares you for work a lot more and we have people from industry come in and talk to us, which is really interesting and helpful."

Fellow student Daisy Ferreira agrees that Ada's focus on practical work and opportunities to forge industry contacts make it stand out.

"I also really enjoy the diversity," she adds. "People come from all around to study here, but we all share similar interests and skills in digital. We can use each other's skills and learn from each other."

In 2019, Ada College will move to a new flagship building in Ashley Road and expand to accommodate up to 1,700 students.

Plans are also being developed to strengthen their apprentice scheme, introduce foundation degrees and work more closely with start-up businesses – as well as preparing current students for this summer's A-levels and looking forward to welcoming a new intake in September.

Talking your way to better health

Having a long-term health condition such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), breathlessness or diabetes can often cause distress and lead to additional difficulties like depression and anxiety. This can impact people's ability to manage their illness and lead to further complications.

The new IAPT (Improving Access to Psychological Therapies) service for long-term conditions offers talking therapies including cognitive behaviour therapy and guided self-help to support patients living with COPD, breathlessness or diabetes who are suffering from low mood or stress related to their condition. The service aims to bring together physical and mental care as one holistic treatment.

Sessions are delivered face-to-face, or by telephone if the sufferer is unable to come in person, and can range from six weeks for brief intervention to 12-20 weeks for more intense treatment.

Janet Balabanovic, psychologist and cognitive behaviour therapist with the IAPT service, said: "I believe that delivering holistic, integrated care is beneficial for patients. I'm excited at being involved in developing a service that aims to pioneer a transformation in the way that healthcare is delivered."

Haringey People caught up with Gerard McGrath, who has suffered from Type II diabetes for 22 years and recently used the IAPT service.

After experiencing a period of depression in summer 2017, which included anxiety and panic attacks brought about by a number of complications with his diabetes, Gerard spoke to his GP about how he could learn effective ways to deal with his low mood.

Once referred to the IAPT service, Gerard had a telephone assessment followed by his first face-to-face appointment.

Gerard says that being able to speak to somebody has helped him gain a better understanding of the way he thinks about and manages his own health.

"I think the really good thing about the service is getting you to be part of the solution," says Gerard. "It's not about them fixing things, it's about them helping you to put it on the table and look at it in a different way."

The IAPT service is easy to access: you can self-refer directly through the IAPT website or you can be referred by your GP, a community diabetes team or through any other physical health professional you are working with. The IPAPT team aim to assess patients' needs within six weeks of their referral.

Crouch End's cultural heart

Millions of pounds will be pumped into restoring Hornsey Town Hall and securing its future for generations to come after ambitious plans were approved by Haringey Council.

The Grade II* listed building at the heart of Crouch End will boast a new arts centre, café/restaurant, community and events spaces and a high-quality hotel under exciting plans that will see the landmark removed from Historic England's 'Heritage at Risk' register.

The development will also include a newly landscaped Town Hall Square, designed following feedback from local residents, a new 'Town Hall Gardens' public space and new housing, including 11 social rented homes.

Haringey-based Time + Space Co. will operate the new arts centre, creating a modern-day future-proofed venue for Crouch End and surrounding areas.

Developers Crouch End (FEC) Ltd will start work this summer, investing

more than £36million in restoration and refurbishment of the Town Hall and the Broadway Annexe – including more than £20million in essential repair and heritage works to preserve historic parts of the building such as the council chamber.

Planning approval follows years of community engagement and painstaking exploration of different options for the building to find the best possible way of safeguarding its future.

John Connolly, Head of UK Development at FEC, said: "The team has worked hard and has sought to reflect the views and interests of local people, whilst at the same time ensuring our proposals are realistic and will secure the future of this iconic building in the heart of Crouch End."

Liz Sich, Chair of the Hornsey Town Hall Creative Trust, said: "At long last, Hornsey Town Hall has a viable long-term future. We believe that this decision represents a key moment in the life of the Town Hall – more than £20million to be spent on the repair and restoration of this nationally important building as well as added investment in the creation of a first-class arts centre.

"We fully expect FEC and Time + Space Co. to continue their engagement with the whole Haringey community and we look forward to working with them".

Picture perfect Tottenham

Moving to a new location is often a difficult time; meeting people and making friends can be tricky when you don't know anyone from the local area.

When Taz and Tom Gray first moved to Tottenham, they decided to tackle the problem head on—creating their own social group, which has gradually evolved into weekly art sessions for local people. Tottenham Art Classes now provide many local residents and visitors with a place to meet others and develop their art skills.

Everything is kept “local”, with lessons taught by local artists in nearby venues to benefit the community, but it’s not exclusive to Tottenham – some students travel from as far afield as Essex. Taz and Tom fit the classes around their full-time jobs, managing the administration and running the sessions.

The twice-weekly classes are held at Lordship Hub in Lordship Recreation

Ground and the Beehive Pub in Bruce Grove, with Monday lessons exploring watercolours, while Thursday evenings feature life drawing. Classes can sometimes have up to 30 students.

“We really enjoy seeing our regulars every week,” says Taz. “It’s become so much a part of our lives now that it’s blurred from participants to friendships.”

The group also works with local business Craving Coffee, which holds an annual exhibition of students’ creations, with artwork available to purchase.

Taz said: “It’s been quite a journey – to get to four years has been amazing. It’s always been a side thing for us, which has turned into getting to know really

nice people in the area and becoming good friends with them.”

Any budding artist who wants to try the classes can just turn up to either venue and can drop in and out as they please. The two-hour sessions cost £8 for the Monday watercolour class and £5 for the Thursday evening life drawing class, including paint, brushes, drawing boards, jam jars and the object to be painted – as well as extra materials for students to experiment with. All you need to bring is your own paper, or you can buy some on the day.

Hornsey Village – a trail through time

This month's History feature comes courtesy of Jennifer Bell and Janet Owen of Hornsey Historical Society

The ancient Parish of Hornsey, centred on Hornsey Village and its parish church, included the settlements now known as Muswell Hill, Stroud Green, Crouch End and the east part of Highgate. It stretched from what was to become the North Circular Road, down to Finsbury Park and west to east from Highgate to Green Lanes.

The first known settlers in the area were Saxons, one of whom was Herenge – their settlement became known as Herenges-hege (settlement of Herenge's people). Over centuries, this word developed into Haringey, Haringay and Hornsey.

A church, dedicated to St. Mary, was built at the centre of the settlement. The first written record of the church is 1291, but it was probably much older. The Church Tower, which remains to this day in the High Street, was built by 1500 with an addition in 1833.

The land was owned by the Bishop of London, as Lord of the Manor of Hornsey. From the Middle Ages to the early 19th century the area was agricultural. With the development of London, Hornsey and its Village became important producers of hay for the capital's horses.

From Stuart times, the Village was a pleasant place for Londoners to visit on Sundays, to fish in the New River, play cricket, quoits and bowls and share a drink in the Three Compasses, the Nightingale Tavern and later the Great Northern Railway Tavern.

Known as 'Healthy Hornsey', wealthy tradespeople from London built large houses here for weekend retreats and often permanent residences. Examples are The Priory, The Elms in the now Priory Road, Eagle House and Eagle Court, which are still in situ in Hornsey High Street.

The opening of Hornsey Station on the Great Northern Railway in 1850 triggered gradual housing development, which accelerated at the end of the 19th century. Much was for the middle classes, but poor-quality working class housing existed, particularly in Hornsey Vale, Campsbourne and insanitary courts off the High Street.


